Former Kentucky All-Americans Booked On Fix

CHICAGO — (AP) — Former All-America basketball greats, Alex Groza and Ralph Beard, today were arrested and charged with accepting bribes to shave points when they were leading Kentucky to collegiate fame in 1949.

Dale Barnstable, one of their teammates of two years ago when Kentucky paraded to its second successive NCAA crown after Olympic reknown of 1948, was picked up simultaneously by New York district attorney men in Louisville last night. He was being questioned there.

Groza and Beard admitted during questioning of accepting bribes.

With the breaking of the Kentucky case, the baseball fix decay now has implicated at least 34 players from seven teams. The other schools involved are Bradley, Toledo, CCNY, Manhattan, Long Island, and New York U.

Vincent A. G. O'Connor, assistant district attorney of New York, interrogated Beard and Groza for seven hours after they were taken in custody at midnight while attending the annual all-star basketball game at Chicago stadium.

Their Kentucky coach, Adolph Rupp, directed the collegian squad in the game, but later disappeared and could not be found for comment on the arrest of his two former stars.

O'Connor said Beard and Groza would admit only to receiving \$500 together with Barnstable to shave points of the Kentucky-Loyola contest, March 14, 1949, in Madison Square Garden. The N. I. T. tournament game was won by Loyola 67-56 in a surprising upset.

Groza and Beard, who were to be arraigned in Cook county criminal court at 11 a. m. CST, today and then taken to New York, were picked up last night along with teammates Cliff Barker and Joe Holland.

State's Attorney John S. Boyle of Chicago, who sat in at the questioning, said Groza and Beard cleared the other two of any taint in the fixing.

All four, along with another former Kentucky great, Wallace (Wah Wah) Jones, are now members and stockholders of the Indianapolis Olympians of the National Basketball association, a pro club they organized after graduation.

Germany, U. S. At Peace After Resolution Passed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The state of war with Germany is ended. A congressional resolution ending it was signed by President Truman yesterday. This means that Germany are no longer enemy aliens in the eyes of this country.

The resolution makes it easier for Germans to do business and travel in the United States, it permits Germans to sue in U. S. courts and it opens the way for possible establishment of a German embassy in Washington.

But it is not a peace treaty. The East-West split in Germany has prevented that.

PONTIAC, Mich. — (AP) — The AFL picketed the AFL because the AFL didn't like the AFL's hiring of non-union labor.

Two pickets from the building tradesmen and carpenters local 998, of Berkeley, marched in front of the Pontiac-Oakland federation of Labor Temple yesterday while unaffiliated workers put a new roof on the building.

The roof was completed at 5 p. m. and the pickets withdrew.

A spokesman for the federation said the non-union roofers were hired by the roofing contractor, who had promised that union labor would be used for the job.

BILL WOULD GRANT BONUSES

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Thousands of "old timers" in the army and air force would be able to collect re-enlistment bonuses under a bill sent to the White House yesterday by the Senate.

Payments ranging up to \$360 have been held up on a technical ruling of the comptroller general for men who signed up for another indefinite hitch prior to October 1, 1949, without being formally discharged and then re-enlisting.

County Surveyor Dies After 30 Years On Job

N. E. (Gene) Richardson, 75, Douglas county surveyor, died suddenly yesterday afternoon after suffering a heart attack. He had been a county surveyor for the last 30 years.

He was born June 3, 1876 in Minnesota and came to Oregon 50 years ago living in Roseburg since 1905. He was a resident of S. Main street at the time of his death. He was a member of the BPO Elks No. 326, of Roseburg.

Surviving are his widow, Hallie, Roseburg; a step-daughter, Mrs. Wm. Humphrey, Powers, Ore.; a nephew, Don Mulvey, Los Angeles; and a cousin, Mrs. A. C. Parslow, Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral home, Monday, Oct. 22, at 2 p. m. with the Rev. Rae Kleinfeld officiating. Interment will follow in the Civil Bend cemetery.

Nebraska Funeral Slated For Victim Of Accident

Funeral services and interment for Jerry L. Schumacher, 21, who died Oct. 18 from injuries suffered in an auto accident on highway 99 near Dillard, will be held in Lincoln, Neb. The body will be shipped tonight by the Roseburg Funeral home.

Truman And Taft Best Qualified

CHICAGO — (AP) — President Truman and Senator Taft (R-Ohio) have been named in a poll of newspaper editors as the "best qualified" in their respective parties for the presidency.

The poll was conducted by the National Editorial association with 319 editors of small daily and weekly newspapers participating. The editors, a NEA spokesman said, were "pretty well scattered" across the country.

In the vote for best qualified Democrat, Mr. Truman received 64 ballots, with Senator Douglas (D-Ill) second with 63 and Senator Byrd (Va) third with 62. Other receiving votes included General Eisenhower, 19; Chief Justice Vinson of the supreme court, 14; Senator Kefauver (Tenn), 8; Governor James Byrnes of South Carolina, 5.

Taft polled 128 votes to lead the Republicans. In second place was Gen. Eisenhower with 87, followed by Gov. Earl Warren of California, 36, former Gov. Harold Stassen of Minnesota, 28; Gen. MacArthur, 10; Sen. Morse (Ore.), 5, and Sen. Duff (Pa.), 4.

The poll showed that 157 of the editors identified their newspapers as independent in politics, 126 as Republican and 36 as Democratic.

Melvin Mills Doan, 81, of Tri-City area died early today after a lingering illness.

A retired rancher, he was born at La Trobe, Calif., Feb. 11, 1870, and came to Oregon 27 years ago. He had been a resident of the Tri-City area 4 1/2 years. He was married in 1899 at Winnemucca, Nev.

Surviving are the widow, Rose; three children, Cecil Melvin Doan, Mrs. Ora Sturgeon and Robert Daniel Doan; two nieces, one nephew and six grandchildren.

Services will be Monday at 2 p. m. in the chapel of Ganz Mortuary, Myrtle Creek. Chris-tian Science reader Mrs. Margaret Starbuck will officiate. Interment will be in the IOOF cemetery at Myrtle Creek.

Senate Votes To Impose Death Sentence On Spies

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate has voted to impose the death sentence or imprisonment up to life both peace time and wartime spies.

The measure, sponsored by Senator O'Connor (D-Md), was passed yesterday. It now goes to the House.

The law now provides capital punishment or imprisonment up to 30 years for spies convicted in war time, and for prison sentences up to 20 years for peace time spies.

Junior High Will Launch Magazine Sales Campaign

The Junior high school student body will hold its 15th annual magazine subscription campaign, starting Monday and continuing through Tuesday, Nov. 6, announces Principal R. R. Brand.

Purpose of the drive, held each year in the fall, is to provide income with which the student body carries on its program of school activities, including both inter-school and intramural athletics.

In addition, said Brand, proceeds from this campaign are used to buy additional items of school equipment. For example, during the past years the school has secured such items as a motion picture projector, stage curtains, electric score board for the gym, school sound system, choir robes and many others.

The sales plan is known as the Curtis Circulation Co. school plan, and includes an opportunity for either new or renewal subscriptions to approximately 80 popular magazines.

Student salesmen will be identified by a letter of introduction and by their associated student body membership card. Questions and problems that might arise may be cleared up or additional information obtained by calling the junior high principal's office, said Brand.

In addition to commissions ranging from 30 to 50 percent on sales retained by the schools, individual student salesmen are rewarded for their efforts with individual merchandise prizes provided by the school. There will also be room prizes in the form of theater party and ice cream feeds and special awards in recognition of special sales effort.

"The student body association has been very cooperative of the generous support the community has given this major project of the year," said Brand. "It has made possible carrying on its program of activities and acquiring needed equipment."

tinuing to pay taxes at present rates, and adding on an extra payment amounting to 9 percent of the income remaining after payment of the tax. This alternate method benefits single persons with incomes of \$28,000 or more a year, and married couples above \$57,600.

Excise Boosts listed

Here are some of the principal excise boosts:

Whisky, gin, brandy and other hard liquor from \$9 a 100-proof gallon to \$10.50. Beer from \$8 to \$9 a barrel. Wine up an average of 12 1/2 percent.

Cigarettes up from 7 cents a pack to 8 cents. Gasoline from 1 1/2 to 2 cents a gallon.

Automobiles increased from 7 to 10 percent of manufacturers' price. Trucks and buses, from 5 to 8 percent.

Electric dishwashers, electric garbage disposal units, power lawnmowers and other items of household equipment put under a 10 percent manufacturers' tax.

Fountain pens, mechanical pencils, cigarette lighters will be taxed 15 percent of the manufacturers' price.

There will be a new 10 percent tax on the gross receipts of book-makers and lottery operators, including persons engaged in the numbers racket. This one promises to be an enforcement headache for the internal revenue bureau.

Sympathetic Court Takes Nameless, Homeless Boy

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — He is three years old and his name is Stanley. All else about him is a mystery.

On Oct. 2 Stanley — his last name is not known — was left in the care of Mrs. Carrie M. Nation at her home in Bell Gardens by an unidentified woman who agreed to pay for the lad's keep.

But the woman left no name or address.

On Oct. 10, Mrs. Nation was found dead in her bed, and Stanley was taken in by sympathetic county juvenile officers. Mrs. Nation had never told the boy's family name or where his parents lived.

The unidentified woman never returned.

Stanley's only possessions are a shirt and a pair of overalls. His only pal is a dog — likewise nameless.

Fireman Injured In Portland Fire

PORTLAND — (AP) — A \$150,000 fire ripped through the four-story Postal building at 510 S. W. Third Ave., in downtown Portland yesterday afternoon.

One fireman was injured, but not seriously, when struck in the head by a stream of water.

A woman, Mrs. Anita Emerson, was trapped on the third floor and was rescued by ladder.

Firemen said the blaze started in the basement and burned up through the first and second floors. The ground floor was occupied by a fountain, a paint company, a music store and a sporting goods store.

A fire wall prevented the blaze from spreading to an adjacent building.

Fire Marshal Miles Woodworth estimated at least \$40,000 worth of musical instruments were destroyed in the Portland Music Co. store.

Maintenance Man Killed When Power Line Touched

LAKEVIEW — (AP) — A shock from 12,000 volts killed John Bernard Jones, maintenance supervisor for Surprise Valley Rural Electrification corporation yesterday afternoon.

There was no witness. Jones had, a few minutes before, sent his assistant, Frank Padgett, and Mrs. Hugh Cahill, Adel, to a nearby hill to check on radio interference.

When they returned, Jones was on the ground at the base of a pole. Sheriff Tommy Elliott said Jones may have lost his balance and touched the power line.

Survivors include his wife and small son here and his mother, Mrs. Eliza Stasney, Idaho Springs, Colo.

PLACED ON PROBATION

100 Still Search For Missing Boy

WALLA WALLA — (AP) — One hundred volunteers pressed a search today for a 14-year-old boy missing in the snowy Blue mountains after finding new evidence that the boy had left Boy Scout markers.

The Wallawalla high school student, Bobby Boatman, has been missing since Sunday morning.

Hopes of searchers were fanned by the finding of a trail of fresh gum wrappers and Boy Scout signs carrying the same "stop and help" meaning of previous signs found in the area.

The gum wrappers were of a brand the boy was known to be carrying. They were found in the narrow, steep box canyon on Butte creek south of Godman springs. The heavily timbered canyon eventually terminated at Troy, Ore.

Twenty-five penitentiary inmates who asked to help were among the searchers.

"This is the first real chance we've had to do something worthwhile," said one inmate.

"Run away?" said another. "not a chance. We came up here to help with a job and we intend to see it through."

Forest service officials praised the work of the inmates.

months, Congress got rid of a lot of "must" measures yesterday. Civil Service Pay Considered

It went to the President bills raising the pay of about 1,600,000 civil service and postal workers by from \$300 to \$800 a year; hiking postal rates an estimated \$117,000,000 annually; boosting most people's income taxes between 11 and 12 percent starting Nov. 1, and ending the state of war with Germany.

When the three money bills are passed, Congress will have appropriated about \$85,000,000,000 for the 1952 fiscal year which began July 1.

The compromise foreign aid bill agreed upon last night pretty well split the difference between the Senate and House.

The total was \$154,000,000 less than the House voted and \$120,000,000 above the senate figure. The conferees accepted the \$100,000,000 special item for Spain put into the measure in the Senate at the urging of Senator McCarran (D-Nev).

The final version carried \$5,788,502,457 in military funds and \$1,440,401,519 for economic help as well as the money for Spain. The bill also re-appropriates \$816,727,304 of carry-over money from the previous fiscal year so that more than \$8,000,000,000 is available for fiscal 1952.

Asks For More

President Truman had asked for \$8,500,000,000 in new money for the global aid program. The compromise bill grants about 86 percent of his request.

The money will go to friends of this nation throughout the world. About four-fifths of it is for Europe.

However, the one case in which the conferees took the lower of the figures in dispute between the two branches involved military aid for Europe.

The House voted \$5,072,476,271 for this purpose and the Senate \$4,818,852,457. The latter was accepted.

Conferees on the first supplemental bill agreed upon a \$74,945,000 allotment for civil defense. Mr. Truman had asked for \$535,000,000.
