

Coach Charges Tulsa With Illegal Tactics

MILWAUKEE — A decision was expected today on whether athletic competition between Marquette university and the University of Tulsa will await one football game.

Marquette Coach Lide Blackburn has charged that Tulsa used "flagrant illegal tactics" in a contest last Saturday. He said he would not permit a team of his to play against the Golden Hurricane.

Tulsa Coordinator of Athletics Dr. George D. Small countered Tuesday by suggesting an immediate end to sports competition because of what he called Blackburn's "unsportsmanlike" outburst.

Salvation Army Itemizes Budget In Chest Appeal

The biggest local item on the Roseburg Community Chest budget for 1952 is an item of \$7,250 for the Salvation Army.

The Army budget is earmarked to comprise slightly over half the total 1952 budget of \$12,435 dollars. Other money is expected to come from collections made in taverns, weekly offerings, sale of old clothing, paper, furniture and other items, income from Christmas kettles, tithes, etc.

With this income from both the Chest and other sources mentioned, the active local Salvationists will give service encompassing the complete span of man's life, from pre-natal care to aid for the aged.

Working on the premise that "the surest way to lead a needy person back to God is first to serve him when he is in need," the Army looks first to the physical needs. The local Army engages in social service, cares for unmarried mothers and infants, finances Red Shield clubs for boys and service to institutions such as prisons, old age homes and hospitals. Besides a myriad of youth activities, the Army sponsors trips to a summer camp. Like any other organization, expenses soar with the Christmas season when additional money is spent for grocery orders, toys and gifts for the children, and other gifts.

As voiced by a Salvation Army spokesman, the organization is everywhere — "on every front of human need."

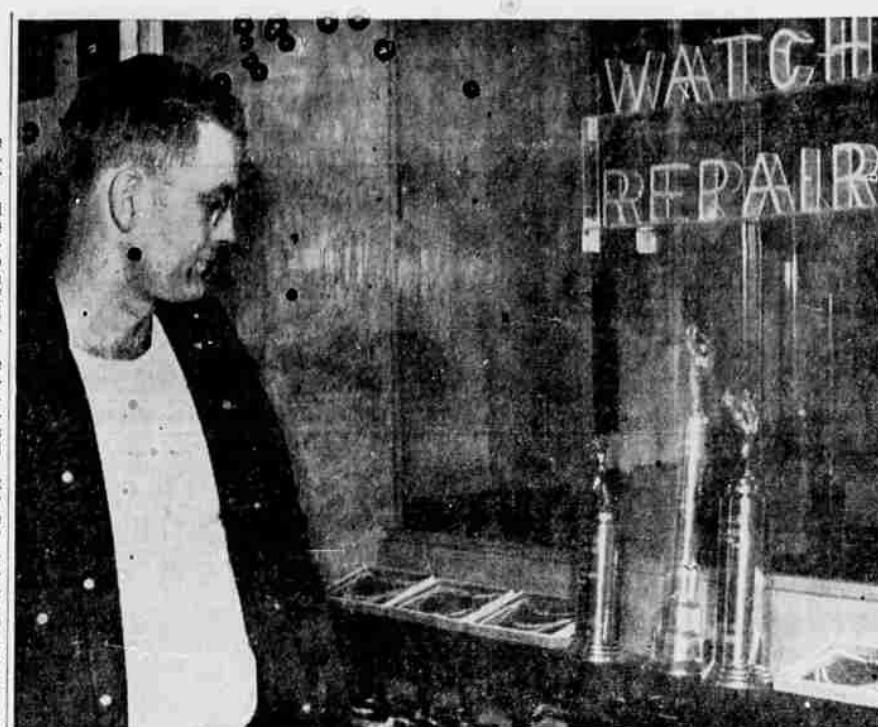

Mental Patient, Officer Slain In Fight; 6 Hurt

PETERSBURG, Va. — A badly wounded mental institution escapee, shotgun still cradled in his arms, was killed Tuesday by a fusillade of bullets that ended a seven-hour gun battle in which a state police investigator was killed and six other persons were hurt.

Police shot Herbert Johnson, 37-year-old Negro, after storming an unoccupied two-story farm house in which he had taken refuge following his flight from the nearby Central State hospital.

Investigator Wallace M. Simpson, 39, was killed by a shot from the window as he tried to rush the house. Two other officers were wounded slightly as they tried to recover Simpson's body.

Also wounded during the siege, in which Johnson held off some 35 officers, were two patients and two hospital employees.
