

Poisonous Mushrooms Sought By Researchers

PORTLAND—A — A thousand pounds of a scarlet-capped, pointsonous mushroom are wanted by the Oregon Mycological society, which thinks it will be able to get them from coastal residents.

L. D. Carson, a committee chairman for the society, said he had promised 1000 pounds to the national institute of arthritis and metabolical diseases at Bethesda, Md. But so far he has collected only 35 pounds.

This is the time of year when the mushroom is round, he said, along the coast. He added that it was unmistakable: a scarlet cap, yellow to white warts, white gills, stem enlarged at the ground, and its shape like a globe.
