Dispensation Of Drugs Comes Under Govt. Rule

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman has signed a bill giving the government a tighter grip on dispensation of dangerous drugs.

The bill signed yesterday makes it a federal offense to refill a prescription containing drugs classed as dangerous, without direct authorization by the physician who first prescribed it.

But, the food and drug administration said, the bill also makes it legally permissible to refill, without the doctor's signature, prescriptions classed as simple home remedies.

It also legalizes telephoned prescriptions for all drugs, with the provision the pharmacist must immediately put the prescription in writing and file it.

The food and drug administration said that six months hence manufacturers will be required to label all dangerous drugs.

Nationalists Rejoice Over British Election

TAIPEI, Formosa — (AP) — Chinese Nationalists rejoiced today over the return of Conservatives to power in Britain.

The Nationalists have been irked at Britain's Labor government ever since it recognized the Communist government of mainland China in January, 1950.

Nationalist officials said they hoped a new Conservative British government would withdraw that recognition and work for a common Anglo-American policy in the Orient.

Battered Body Found In Road

EUGENE — (AP) — Police today were attempting to identify the battered body of a young man found lying in the middle of highway 58 last night by a truck driver.

Coroner Fred Buell said the youth, probably in his late teens, was found about 4:30 a.m. and brought to a hospital in Eugene. He died two hours later without regaining consciousness.

There was no identity on the body. Buell said death came from multiple fractures and punctures, including a fractured skull.

Buell said police are investigating to find whether the man was beaten and left on the highway or struck by a vehicle. He was found about five miles west of Oakridge ear Hellgate bridge.

Production Officials Say Plumbing Supplies Scarce

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Defense production officials say there just are not enough bathtubs, and other plumbing supplies, to put into homes that might otherwise be built.

The officials said it looked like a choice between allocating more scarce brass to the plumbing industry, or curtailing home building. They said nothing would be done probably, either way until spring.

The officials, who asked not to be named, made their comments at a meeting of defense production administration and national production authority officials with business news editors.

Car Crashes Into Room, Backs Out And Vanishes

Then the flabbergasted couple watched as the auto backed out and vanished — leaving a gaping hole in the wall of their apartment.

Egyptian Attitude Will Remain Same

CAIRO — (AP) — Winston Churchill's election victory will not make any difference in Egypt's attitude towards Britain, Interior Minister Fouad Serag El Din Pasha said last night.

"It makes no difference to us whether Conservative or Labor (wins)," said El Din. "The only question is that of policy."

Egyptian newspapers commented sarcastically on the Tory victory and warned Churchill that Egypt will not be deflected from pursuing the realization of "her rights, even if the new British government resorts to force."

The pro-government paper Al Misri predicted that "Churchill will attempt to frighten us with more bloodshed. Welcome, Churchill. We shall prove to the world that the Egyptian people shall attain its sovereignty and freedom against the greatest imperialist the world has ever seen. Churchill will see."

Brig. Gen. J. T. Pierce, USMC ret., spoke to the scout executives. He said that as men and citizens of the community, it was necessary for each member present to vote if the boys were not to be robbed of their heritage.

Walter Smith, field scout executive, gave his report and noted that there are about 4,000 boys in Douglas county who are eligible to join the Boy Scouts. Presently, there are only 1,027 active members.

The motto for the coming year will be: "Take Scouting to More Boys."

Kentucky's Basketball Stars Freed On Bail

NEW YORK — (AP) — Ralph Beard, Alex Groza and Dale Barnstable, former University of Kentucky basketball stars, are free on bail today after pleading innocent on charges of fixing a 1949 tournament game.

The three unfrocked players were indicted yesterday on charges of fixing the March 14, 1949 game against Loyola of Chicago. They were also charged with conspiracy covering Kentucky's 1948-49 schedule.

The players pleaded innocent and were released on \$1,000 bail each. Five alleged fixers also were indicted and released on bail ranging from \$2,500 to \$10,000.
