Fortune Of \$50 Million Bequeathed To Humanity

RENO — (AP) — Max C. Fleischmann left his huge fortune to humanity when he took his life at Santa Barbara, Calif., last week. The fortune — estimated by friends at more than \$50,000,000 — will go almost entirely into the Max C. Fleischmann foundation of Nevada, the state in which he lived most of the past 15 years.

Established last March, the foundation will be administered by his wife, Sarah, and five other trustees. All of the money, he stipulated, must be used within 20 years after Mrs. Fleischmann's death for furthering "the public welfare... or well-being of mankind."

Heir to a vast yeast and distillery fortune, Fleischmann shot himself after he learned he was incurably ill with cancer.

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Radio And TV Bans Hit Song "Sweet Violets"

DETROIT — Lyrics of the song "Sweet Violets" have been banned by both WWJ and WWJ-TV, the Detroit News, Harry Bannister, the station's general manager, said.

Playing of the song on the Wayne King show Thursday night on WWJ-TV resulted in its censorship after the first verse. TV viewers saw instead a printed announcement saying the program was being edited because the station considered certain parts unfit for reception in homes.

Bannister said the ban on "Sweet Violets" came after a rash of objectionable versions began to hit the airwaves.

The ban also includes lyrics of the song "I Get Ideas."

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
