

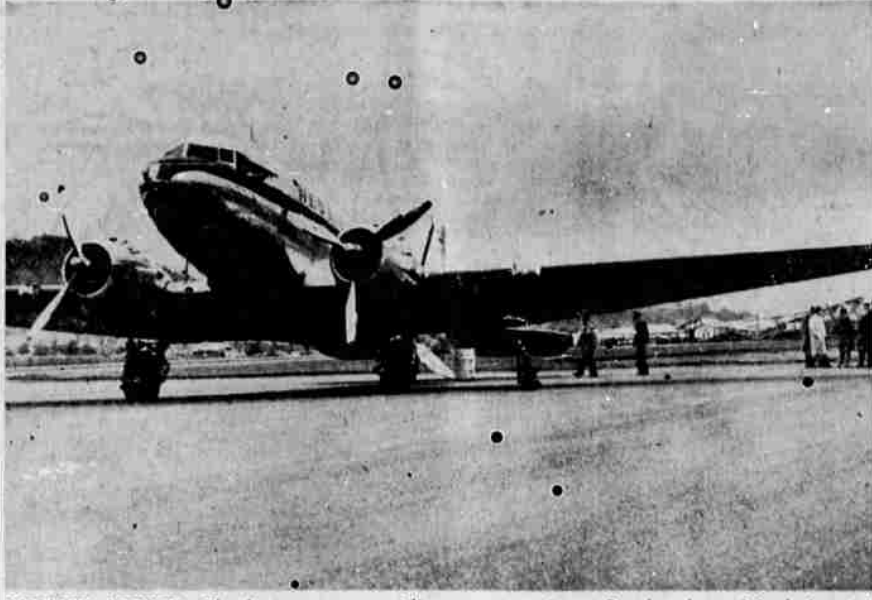


Linfield Student Badly Burned In Bonfire Mishap

MCMINNVILLE — (AP) — A Linfield college student was severely burned Friday in a melee that developed from an attempt to touch off a bonfire here.

James R. Fryrear, 19-year-old junior from Lebanon, was under treatment at a hospital for second and third degree burns to both legs.

Freshmen had collected a pile of wood and other material for a homecoming bonfire to precede the Linfield-Oregon College of Education football game here.

Gabrielson Faces No Attack From Backers Of Ike

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Backers of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower apparently have agreed not to make any effort to oust Guy G. Gabrielson as chairman of the Republican National committee.

And evidence accumulated that President Truman may not be ready to pick a successor to William M. Boyle Jr. when the Democratic national committee meets here next week to accept Boyle's resignation as chairman.

Influential Republicans who are getting ready to launch a movement to draft Eisenhower for the 1952 GOP presidential nomination were reported shying away from any move to replace Gabrielson.

Senator Ives (R-NY), an Eisenhower backer, told reporters he knows of "no concentrated movement" to oust the chairman.

The Eisenhower camp was said to feel that if any such effort were successful in the face of Gabrielson's demonstrated determination to hang on to his job, it would be interpreted as a party admission there was some substance to charges against him.

Gabrielson has denied he did anything wrong in seeking more time for repayment of an RFC loan to Carthage Hydrocol, Inc., a company he represents as president and general counsel. W. Stuart Symington, RFC director, called Gabrielson's activities normal and routine.

The GOP chairman is supporting the bid of Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio for the party's presidential nomination. But they apparently can't agree on any candidate to run against Gabrielson, even if they were of a mind to challenge his committee leadership.

Although Taft has been miffed at Gabrielson for taking the political edge off charges against Boyle, the Ohio senator is reported to have told his supporters he wanted to avoid any fight within the committee before next year's nominating convention.

A Democratic seator, who asked not to be quoted by name, said he had been informed that if the President doesn't find the right man by the time of the Oct. 31 committee meeting, the committee will be asked to let the job go unfilled for a while.

However, Boyle has invited members of Congress and other officials to a reception for the new chairman on the night of the committee's scheduled meeting, indicating his belief the job will be filled then.

Labor And Small Earnings Plague Businessmen Today

NEW YORK — (AP) — Labor difficulties and disappointing corporate earnings were trouble spots this week in an otherwise encouraging economy.

Defense orders held industrial production at high rates. Civilian goods moved a little more freely. Dangerous inventories were trimmed further.

Announcements of third quarter profits showed that higher taxes and increasing costs were taking ever larger bites.

Prices slid downward on the New York stock exchange. The drop was attributed chiefly to disappointment over earnings of many large corporations.

Election Didn't Bolster
The narrow Conservative majority in Britain did nothing to bolster the market.

As corporations released their earnings figures in increasing numbers the impact of taxes and costs on the economy became graphically illustrated.

Considered in the light of the dire predictions for the third quarter that were made last spring, many of the earnings statements weren't too bad.

There were a good number too that showed profits above or about equal with the third quarter of 1950. Many economists pointed out that slight declines from record high 1950 figures were not exactly grounds for pessimism.

But it was a large bite that taxes and greater costs took out of many of the big corporations. In many instances record high sales brought lower profits. It was costing more to make a dollar.

Winds Up With Less
Take Bethlehem Steel Corp., the nation's second largest steel producer. Bethlehem did 28 percent more business than last year and wound up with 28 percent less earnings.

Chairman E. R. Grace said the return for nine months was 5.1 percent on peacetime record net billings of \$1,322,861,826 compared with a return of 8.5 percent on billings for all of last year.

He said the industry is in no position to volunteer a wage increase. He said even without such an increase the industry was entitled to a price hike.

And he anticipated over production of steel as a result of the industry expansion program. The problem before the end of 1952, he said, will be to find customers.

General Motors corporation attributed a sharp decline in third quarter earnings — \$92,207,779 this year against \$17,377,767 a year ago — to lower commercial volume, higher costs and a lower margin of profit on defense work.

GM said defense production was pushed vigorously but its increase was not enough to offset the decline in civilian output.

Concerning taxes, the provision was \$231,344,000 for the third quarter this year against \$259,205,000 a year ago. But for the nine months period the taxes were higher — \$740,219,000 this year

than the \$604,601,000 a year ago. Net earnings for the nine months were down to \$372,790,913 against \$702,655,256 last year. Sales were off about \$271 million in the third quarter and they were up about \$3 million on the nine months.

Liquor Price Increase Larger Than Expected

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The office of Price Stabilization says liquor prices may go up somewhat more than the increase indicated by new taxes becoming effective Nov. 1.

OPS said it may let liquor dealers increase their mark-up — percentage of profit — along with adding on the tax. The tax will add about 26 cents on a fifth of ordinary whiskey.

The price office said a separate regulation dealing with the liquor industry will be issued shortly.

But markup increases will not be permitted on such things as cigarettes and gasoline, OPS said, where they are habitually sold at so much, plus tax. Dealers will only be allowed to add the tax, OPS said.

But in the midst of these encouraging signs there were strike stoppages and rumblings of further labor troubles.
