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All Oregon Truck Licenses Expire December 31st

If you know enough to come in out of the rain, you'll take the advice of the local branch of the Oregon Motor Vehicle division and renew your license tabs, if they expire in January.

Mrs. A. J. Farenbaugh, branch manager of the office, suggests that motorists renew the license plate tabs early, and for good reason. If you wait until the last part of December to beat the January expiration date, you will run into the year-end rush of truck owners for truck licenses. With the new quarters on North Main street, you may have to wait outside the building because of the limited space in the office.

Mrs. Farenbaugh noted that truck licenses all expire Dec. 31 at midnight, so truck owners form a jam that may mean several hours wait. She cited last year as an example. Approximately 3,000 renewal requests piled up between Dec. 15 and the last day of the month. As the time for renewal grew short, lines queued far down the corridors from the former office on the second story of the courthouse. Some people had to wait as long as four hours.

Also with the approaching turn of the year, Mrs. Farenbaugh reported that a new fee schedule would go into effect Jan. 1. In addition to the previously published schedule, it was announced that registration fees for commercial trucks will be lowered and fees for farm trucks will be increased. No figures have been released by the secretary of state's office. To be included under new fees are two wheel trailers for hire. No fee figure has been announced.

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Education Aims Theme At P. T. A. Council Meeting

Today the guiding principle of public education is still the fact that it is free — in every sense of the word. Schools can afford anything the people will work for, vote for and pay for. M. C. Deller, superintendent of Myrtle Creek schools, made these statements before members of the Douglas County Council of Parents and Teachers Saturday at an all-day meeting at the Dillard school.

The council's strides in the field of radio and in the interpretation of schools to the people were brought out during the conference, which included the regular business meeting, the speaker of the day, discussion of questions from the question box, group singing and a dessert luncheon, served by the Dillard PTA ladies.

School's Arms Modernized
"The school's major concern is the development of each child to his greatest capacity — socially, physically, emotionally, mentally, and spiritually, so that each child may become a contributing member in a democratic society," Deller continued as he developed his theme "The Aims of Modern Education."

"Schools should have and do want constructive criticism, not knockdown tactics," he declared as he clearly explained the advantages of the new methods and procedures. Backing every statement he made with authentic sources, Deller passed printed sheets for members to take back to their PTA's. The sheets listed (1) organizations they should question, (2) others making malicious attacks on the schools, (3) what good citizens can do to defend the schools, (4) a check list to test how good a school is, and (5) a check list to determine how interested and informed the individual is.

Radio Cooperates

The managers of Douglas county's two radio stations have cooperated so enthusiastically with the council's radio and parent-education committees that the county is attracting state-wide attention. Mrs. N. D. Johnson, radio chairman, reported. Mrs. Kenneth Bushey, council president, has been asked to write the story of the council's achievements in radio for the Oregon Parent-Teacher.

Radio station KRNK, managed by LeRoy Hiatt, broadcasts a series of public relations programs, planned to interpret the schools and PTA to the listening audience at 4:30 p.m. on Thursdays. Mrs. Jennelle Moorhead, Oregon Congress president, came to Roseburg to launch the series with "Partners in Education." Last week John A. Lucas, teacher of exceptional children in Roseburg, was the speaker. On Nov. 1 listeners may hear M. C. Deller on the subject "The Aims of Modern Education." Forthcoming programs will be published weekly in the News-Review.

Mrs. Iris Hellwell is manager of radio station KRLX, over which a series of programs, called "The Inquiring Parent," is offered currently from 2-2:15 p.m. on Wednesdays.

Mrs. Charles M. Cord, parent education chairman, suggested that the radio study group is one of the easiest to get started. A list, easier simply invites one or more neighbors in to listen and they discuss the program over a bit of refreshment. Without the stimulation of discussion one is apt to let the ideas "go in one ear and out the other," Mrs. M. Cord said. The "Inquiring Parent" study club enrollment blanks from study group chairmen.

In reporting on the board of managers' meeting she attended recently, in Portland, Mrs. Bushey expressed the urgent need for magazines for the soldiers in Korea. Magazines may be sent by PTA units or individuals to the following address: Chaplain's office, U. S. Navy hospital, Navy 3923, Fleet Post Office, San Francisco, Calif. All magazines are welcome, but the smaller sizes are particularly usable in the hospitals.

Mrs. Bushey announced also that an accredited course on PTA is now available at the state teachers' colleges in Oregon. She asked all program chairmen to send copies of their year books to the state program chairman, Mrs. Gene Tanner, Lebanon, Ore.

The question and answer session was presided over by Mrs. Roy Denman, Myrtle Creek, council vice-president, and Mrs. Bushey. Questions from buzz groups were added to those in the question box and answered by the group. A few of the subjects discussed were: How to get more voters out to vote on the school budget? Why do PTA dues vary in different schools? What are the duties of room mothers? Should a parent adjourn the meeting before or after the program? These and other questions were answered to the satisfaction of the inquirers, to be taken back to their respective Parent-Teacher associations.

Norway Sticks To Allied Treaty, Russia Is Told

OSLO, Norway — (AP) — Norway today told the world — and Russia especially — that membership in the North Atlantic Treaty organization (NATO) is the basis of the Scandinavian nations' security policy.

Speaking to the sorting (parliament) a day after he rejected Russian charges that the Spitzbergen islands are being fortified, Foreign Minister Halvard Lange said NATO membership gives Norway "relative safety" as opposed to dangers in the world today.

Lange declared that aggression against Norway would bring the aid of NATO's strongest member nations.

Nancy Sinatra Granted Divorce From Crooner

SANTA MONICA, Calif. — (AP) — Nancy Sinatra won a divorce from her crooning husband Tuesday without mention of his traveling companion, Ava Gardner.

In fact, the dark-haired wife and mother testified that Sinatra explained his prolonged absences from home with the old alibi: "I was out with the boys."

Superior Judge Orlando H. Rhodes granted the divorce on grounds of cruelty just a year and a month after she had won a previous decree of separate maintenance.

She testified that Frank had asked her many times for a divorce, presumably during the crooner's international headline chase of the sultry Miss Gardner. The 31-year-old wife said she waited "because I wanted to be sure he knew what he was about."

Judge Rhodes approved a property settlement wherein Mrs. Sinatra will get 33 percent of the singer's income up to \$150,000 annually and 10 percent when it goes over that figure. The settlement disclosed that the puny crooner earned \$367,000 from Jan. 1 to Aug. 31 of this year.

Sinatra already has filed for a Nevada divorce. He and Miss Gardner romanced during his six weeks required residence in Nevada, and are now in New York City where Sinatra appears on television.

Mrs. Sinatra gets custody of the couple's three children, Nancy, 11; Frank Jr., 7; and Christina, 3. She and Sinatra were married Feb. 4, 1939, in Jersey City, N. J., and separated 11 years later.

Girl Fatally Clawed By Angry Circus Lion

MENA, Ark. — (AP) — The granddaughter of an animal trainer was fatally clawed last night by an enraged lion.

Maria de la Luz was attacked by the animal when she entered its cage, apparently through an unlocked door. Sheriff Hobart Hensley of Polk county reported.

The nine-year-old child was traveling with her grandmother, Mrs. Louisa De Campa, an animal trainer for the Campa Brothers' circus.

Sheriff Hensley said Maria apparently had been on familiar terms with the animals.

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
