

Cancer Society's Meet Will Draw Douglas Delegates

Eight Douglas county delegates are planning to attend the educational conference of the American Cancer society to be held in Portland Nov. 8 and 9. Those going from Roseburg are Mrs. Celia Day, commander of the Douglas county Cancer society; Mrs. Erka Graham, vice commander; Mrs. Lloyd Hayes, secretary; Miss Patricia Mayo, educational chairman and Dr. B. R. Shoemaker, Douglas county medical director of the society. Mrs. Iva Cowan, Yoncalla; Mrs. Blaine Johnson, Azalea and Mrs. Ruby Moore of Camas Valley will also be present.

The meeting of the Oregon division of the society will be held at the Multnomah hotel. A feature of the program will be the discussion by outstanding doctors of the following subjects: "What is Cancer?" "The Role of Surgery in Cancer," "The Role of Radiology in Cancer," and "The Emotional Problems of the Cancer Patient and His Family."

The Douglas county officers of the society met with Mrs. Day Tuesday night to make plans for the forthcoming year's work. Present were Mrs. Graham, Miss Mayo and Mrs. Hayes.

Last year an intense education program was carried out through clubs and lodges under the direction of Mrs. Mayo and Dr. Shoemaker. This year's work will follow pretty much the same pattern, with the emphasis on educating the public to the early recognition of cancer's danger signals and the vital need for early medical treatment. In talking to the officers, Mrs. Day also emphasized the great medical strides made the past 20 years in cancer treatment and the increasing amount of hope that this scourge can be conquered. The cooperation of the entire public is necessary if this end is to be achieved, said Mrs. Day.

Only South Can Save Democratic Party, Byrd Says

SELMA, Ala. — (AP) — Senator Byrd (D-Va.), in a bitter attack on the Truman administration, said today only "an immediate uprising of political virility in the south" will save the Democratic party.

"I am calling on you to save the Democratic party from elements now in control who have debauched its principles and made it a party of political expediency, one of its chief articles of trade being the peddling of political influence," Byrd said.

Urging that the anti-Truman forces in the southern states "keep themselves free to take whatever effective action may be necessary" to assure President Truman's defeat if he seeks re-election, the Virginia senator added:

"It is my firm belief that the Democrats of the south will not permit the Trumanites to press down upon the brow of America the un-democratic crown of waste, of Socialism, and of dictation from Washington."

Byrd spoke out in a speech prepared for the annual meeting of the Dallas County Farm bureau. The gathering had been billed as a part of a caucus to anti-Truman southern Democrats, but Byrd was the only nationally prominent figure on hand.

Asserting that only the southern wing of the party can prevent "the downfall of the Democracy and all of the freedoms we hold dear," Byrd said it must ask at next year's party convention for: Restoration of a rule, abolished in 1936, which required a two-thirds majority for selection of the national ticket; elimination of the 1948 civil rights plank; "re-affirmation of states' rights"; and endorsement of "the true principles of the Democratic party."

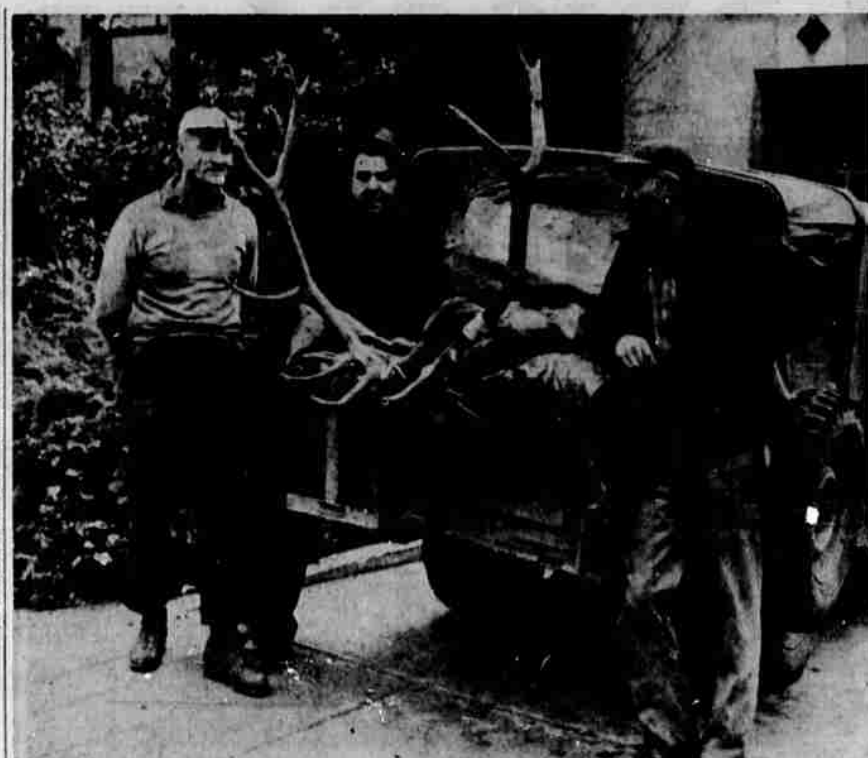

ever before," said Lt. Col. L. G. Hill, the briefing officer.

But he emphasized agreement on the zone would not end the shooting, Hill said:

"There is a possibility the war will go on for a long time afterward."

The buffer zone is only the first point of a proposed armistice. If a battle line changes substantially after an agreement is reached on a buffer zone, Hill said, it probably would have to be negotiated all over again.

Air Score Announced
U. N. war planes shot down 33 Red jets in October — an all time record for one month — Far East air forces announced. Twelve others probably were destroyed and 61 damaged.

The Allies lost a total of 40 planes, mostly to anti-aircraft guns. Red jets shot down nine. They included four B-29s, two F-86 Sabre jets, two F-4 thunderjets, and one unarmed RF-80 reconnaissance jet.

This brought total announced FEAF combat losses for the entire war to 396. Of these, 37 were shot down in air combat, 313 were brought down by ground fire, and six were destroyed on the ground by Red planes.

In Washington the U. S. Defense department announced the Allies have suffered 313,721 casualties during the war and inflicted 1,402,504 on the Communists. Heaviest Allied casualties were suffered by the South Koreans, 212,544, with 95,952 Americans accounting for most of the remainder.

The Rev. W. A. MacArthur of the First Methodist church will officiate. Following the services here, the body will be taken to Lebanon, Ore., for services at the Huston Funeral home at 3:30 p.m. Friday. Vault interment will follow in the Lebanon IOOF Masonic cemetery.

Kent is survived by his widow, Mrs. Erma E. Kent, three children, Karen, Rita, Denise and Terrey Herbert, all of Roseburg; his mother, Mrs. Lulu B. Kent, Lebanon, and two brothers, Sanford Kent and Marion Kent, both of Salem.

Safeway Stores Picketed In Portland Dispute
PORTLAND — (AP) — A number of Safeway stores were picketed here today in a dispute stemming from the discharge of an apprentice.

The appearance of pickets closed the Safeway meat warehouse and some retail stores.

A company spokesman said unfair labor charges would be filed as soon as possible with the National Labor Relations board against the union. He said the discharge was justified.

Driver's Trophy Permanently Held By J. H. Castner

PORTLAND — John H. Castner, Portland and formerly of Roseburg, and for the past 13 years a driver for Pierce Freight Lines, Inc., has won permanent possession of the American Trucking association's national championship driving trophy, according to compilation of results in the recent national "roadster" competition in Chicago.

Castner was named national trucking industry "driver of the year" in 1950 because of his long safe-driving record and his work in promoting highway safety by speaking to school classes and service club groups. During his service with Pierce Lines he has driven over 900,000 miles without an accident. In recognition of his driver-of-the-year award, Castner was personally congratulated by President Truman.

Castner, 37, and a Benson Tech graduate in automotive engineering, first won the national championship trophy in 1949 in Phoenix, Ariz., and retained it in 1950 in New York City. By his recent third-time win, he has retired the four-foot high award from competition.

In addition to the trophy, Castner will receive a \$50-a-month bonus during the next year, according to Pierce Lines officials.

Motor Vehicle Buying In Douglas County Noted

Halloween Blast Hurts 29 Persons

PITTSBURGH — (AP) — A gala Halloween celebration turned into a terror Wednesday night as four gas explosions injured 29 persons and cast flaming debris over hundreds of parading mummies and spectators.

Twenty of the injured were taken to hospitals but nine were released later. Three are reported in critical condition from burns and cuts.

The earthshaking blasts let go in the basement of a confectionery store and dwelling house in the Beltzhoover area of Pittsburgh, a south hills district where a Halloween parade reached the end of its march.

Seven persons were treated at nearby doctors' offices and two received first aid at the scene. Fire Chief James T. Coslett said a broken gas main in Max Davidson's confectionery store set off the explosions. They were felt four blocks away.

Coslett estimated property damage at \$20,000. A roaring fire broke out after the first blast and gutted the two-story building. Davidson's wife, Rose, 63, is among those critically injured.

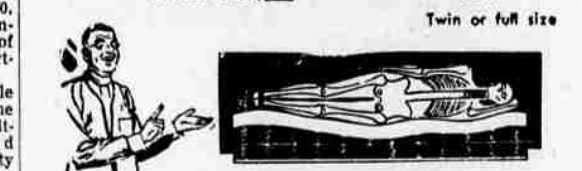
Others on the critical list are Deputy Fire Chief Stephen Adley, 46, and fireman Harry Pemberton, 47. Both suffered burns.
