Congregationalists Oppose Vatican Appointment

SALEM — The East Willamette association of congregational churches opposes President Truman's plan to send an ambassador to the Vatican.

The association, holding its annual meeting here, voted 34 to 14 to ask the President to reconsider. The resolution says such an appointment is in violation of the American principle of separation of church and state.

It also asked Senators Wayne Morse and Guy Cordon to vote against confirmation of any person who is appointed to the job. President Truman said he would give the appointment to Gen. Mark Clark.

The association includes delegates from Willamette valley and southern Oregon churches. The Rev. Robert Bulkley, Cor-

vallis, was chosen as the new moderator. The new assistant moderator is Carl Meyers, Eugene.

Mortgage Money Easier In 1952 For New Homes

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. — Mortgage money to finance new homes will be easier to get in 1952 than it was last year, government housing officials predict.

Raymond M. Foley, administrator of the housing and home finance agency, and Franklin D. Richards, commissioner of the Federal Housing Administration, made a statement to that effect at the fall conference meeting of the National Association of Homebuilders.

"The situation is improving," said Foley, adding, "I believe that during next year there will be

an adequate flow of mortgage money for such building as is reasonably safe for the industry to undertake."

The building industry faced serious harm from over-expansion last year, Foley said.

Would Enter Oregon Primary "If Financed"

DALLAS, Tex. — W. Lee O'Daniel said he is considering entering the Oregon primary as a candidate for president if the "rank and file of the people" will finance him.

"I'd like to run against Truman in any state," the former U. S. senator said in an interview.

O'Daniel said he thinks "the people of Oregon are just as ashamed of Truman as they are in Texas."

"A lot of my friends in Texas are urging me to enter the Oregon primary," he said.

O'Daniel said he has already stated his platform on a radio program.

It includes cutting the government payroll and "repeal of all socialistic and communistic legislation enacted in the last 20 years."

O'Daniel said he thinks the President and all politicians should follow it but none of them paid any attention to it.

"But thousands of letters from my friends came in asking me to run for president on the platform," he said.

O'Daniel, a former flour salesman, became governor of Texas in 1938 and served in the Senate from 1941 to 1948. He now has an insurance company here.

The Oregon primary will be held next May.

Adm. McIntyre Praised For Red Cross Service

WASHINGTON — President Truman praised a former Salem, Ore., man who has retired from a post with the national Red Cross blood program.

He is Admiral Ross T. McIntire, physician to President Franklin D. Roosevelt and former navy surgeon general.

At a luncheon in McIntire's honor, Mr. Truman said:

"It is one of the great satisfactions of being in the office that I occupy that there are people who put the welfare of the nation above their own personal interests. And you would be surprised how many of our public servants are in that category."

McIntire will live at Coronado, Calif.

Gen. and Mrs. M'Arthur To Visit Governor McKay

PORTLAND — (AP) — Gen. and Mrs. Douglas MacArthur will be guests of Governor McKay in Oregon for a few hours Nov. 15.

Sen. Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.) notified McKay Saturday that the MacArthurs would stop briefly in Portland on their return trip from Seattle's centennial celebration. Cain is in charge of MacArthur's trip.

McKay said his invitation to MacArthur has no political significance.

Plans for entertaining the MacArthurs call for a parade and a visit to the Veterans' hospital.

Meantime, F. E. Epton, Portland, said he has more than enough signatures ready for filing to place the name of General MacArthur on the Oregon May primary election ballot as a candidate for the Republican nomination for president.

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
