

Don't Sign Blank Contracts, Auto Buyers Warned

A warning to automobile buyers not to sign contracts in blank has been issued by Earl M. Gregg, chief of the OPS industrial materials branch of the Portland district OPS office, following recent complaints to the OPS.

An average of three persons a week, and, in one case, three car buyers in one day, asked the OPS for advice after finding that their automobile contracts totaled much higher figures than those given verbally by the dealer, Gregg said.

Most of the complaints were traced to one Portland dealer, not a member of the Automobile Dealers association of Portland, he stated.

In some instances, much smaller trade-in values were allowed than originally promised by the dealer. In other cases, extras such as 25,000-mile guarantees, "under coatings," polishing or heaters were added.

"Signing a contract in blank is just like signing a blank check," Gregg warned. "The buyer assumes the risk and as long as the ceiling prices are observed, there's nothing the OPS can do. The dealer, however, cannot legally charge for any extras unless the buyer has requested these in writing."

Gregg emphasized, however, that the OPS can, and does, seek refunds for the car buyer who unwittingly pays above the ceiling prices. He cited two instances where refunds of over \$400 each were made to buyers who were charged over ceiling prices.

Arms Census To Include Atom Weapons, U.S. Plan

as a preliminary step toward general reduction or armaments and armed forces.

President Truman proposed to the last assembly that the U. N. combine atomic discussions with talks on conventional armaments.

This idea has been accepted by the special committee which studied the question during the summer. It is now before the assembly for final action.

The proposal to include atomic weapons in any general arms census thus is considered a logical follow-up to the proposed merger of the Atomic Energy commission and the commission for conventional armaments. The U. S. originally opposed this merger also.

The main idea appeared to be to bring together several outstanding questions under one heading, launching them as a package proposal. According to best information available, this might include a plan to Russia for peace in Korea, the arms question and an appeal for a unified election in all of Germany.

The United Nations general assembly today rejected a Russian demand that the question of giving China's seat to the Communists be given priority in the sixth assembly, opening tomorrow.

The vote was 11 for, 20 against and 11 abstentions.

Russia's Jacob A. Malik threw the explosive question of Chinese representation into what diplomats had hoped would be a non-controversial, ceremonial windup of the fifth session.

He angrily declared "It is time to put an end to this disgraceful attitude toward the Chinese people."

T. F. Tsiang, nationalist Chinese delegate, denounced the Russian proposal as calculated to "decrease peace." He said the regime Malik proposed to admit has been denounced by the assembly as an aggressor in Korea.

Capt. Borgen Completes Korea Combat Duty Tour

3RD BOMBARDMENT WING, Korea—Captain Dale E. Borgen, husband of Mrs. Dale E. Borgen, 858 S. Jackson, Roseburg, is being transferred to Fifth air force headquarters following completion of a tour of combat duty with the 3rd bomb wing.

Captain Borgen flew 55 combat missions with the night-flying wing as a U. S. air force B-26 pilot over Communist targets in Korea.

"The night missions flown by the wing are designed to stop the flow of enemy troops and supplies to the front lines," said Captain Borgen. "It's no picnic, diving down on a convoy at night to drop bombs and strafe. All you can see is enemy tracers coming up toward you."

For his action in the Korea war, Captain Borgen has been awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Air medal with two Oak Leaf clusters and the Korean Service medal with one Bronze Battle Star.

The Borgens have a son, Dennis Eugene. Captain Borgen's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ed Borgen, live at 102 Roberts St., Roseburg.

11 Electrocuted When Truck Hits Power Pole

RIO DE JANEIRO, — (AP) — A truck crashed into a light pole here causing a power line to fall and electrocute 11 of the 70 persons riding in the truck. Nineteen others were hurt.

Those aboard the truck were members of a soccer club returning from a game. The accident occurred about 40 miles from here.

Giant Statues Of Stalin Plan Of Soviet, Two Stooges

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Soviet Russia and the Communist regimes of Hungary and Czechoslovakia are planning to erect giant statues of Joseph Stalin, the "Voice of America" says.

The State department radio said the largest will be in Russia and will "top all other statues of Stalin." More than 70 meters (about 230 feet) tall, it is to be a part of the decoration project for the Volga-Don canal.

"The Czech bootlickers plan to erect an enormous statue to the father who lives in Moscow on Lenin hill, where it will look down on the city of Prague, the city of Masaryk and Benes," the "Voice" said.

"The minute they heard this, the Hungarian bootlickers announced their plan for a statue of the father who lives in Moscow that will tower over the city of Budapest, the city of Kassuth."

An overseas broadcast said the Czech statue would be 20 meters high and the Hungarian statue 30 meters.

The "Voice" quoted a Budapest Communist newspaper as saying that several buildings, including a Catholic church, had to be demolished to make a proper setting for the Hungarian monument.

The "Voice" noted that Stalin has a birthday on Dec. 21 and suggested the plans for the statues were linked to that. It commented

also that Julius Caesar "had a thousand such statues and all have crumbled to dust."
