Liquor Licenses Deferred

Moving to other business, the council decided to postpone action on renewal applications for ten establishments for liquor licenses. The action was taken at the request of the police committee, for further investigation. The reason for investigation was not revealed. The establishments whose licenses expire Jan. 1 are: Westside grocer, Pals tavern, Fairhaven market, Sandy's Place, Friendly tavern, Wally's Pastime, The Windmill, the Elks, and Henningsen's Mart 1 and 2.

The council heard the first and second readings of the designated "Marshfield" ordinance, which will allow condemnation of dangerous buildings. This will include any condition in a building which endangers other buildings, life or property such as defective wiring, delapidation, fire prevention, etc.

Further discussion was heard on the vacation of Bellows road, acquisition of a \$3,100 Hough loader for moving dirt and gravel and installation of additional traffic safety devices to further the present campaign to pare traffic deaths. In routine fashion, the council approved the city's October expenditures and voted a \$2,000 appropriation to the park commission for the second quarter.

Anti-Red Labor Leader Wins Nobel Peace Prize

OSLO, Norway — (AP) — The Nobel peace prize for 1951 has been awarded to Leon Jouhaux of France, the Norwegian Nobel institute announced.

Jouhaux, a militantly anti-Communist labor leader, is the 50th recipient of the prize, awarded by the Nobel committee of the Norwegian parliament. No reason ever is given for the award, which is worth 137,612 Swedish Kroner (\$32,432) this year.

Jouhaux has been vice chairman of the international labor organization. He was an organizer and an executive committee member of the International Confederation of Trades Unions, when it was formed two years ago to counter

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Two Revenue Bureau Employees Discharged

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Two employees of the San Francisco office of the internal revenue bureau, already under suspension, were fired Monday.

A bureau spokesman told reporters that Dorothy C. Frisbie and Edwin M. Furtado were notified that they have been "removed from service" by Commissioner John B. Dunlap.

They were suspended Oct. 27 along with collector James G. Smith and six other employees of the San Francisco office.

The bureau's spokesman said Frisbie has been indicted on charges of embezzlement from an employee's credit union and Furtado has been indicted on charges of embezzlement of Federal funds.

The cases are the first of those suspended in San Francisco to be finally disposed of, the spokesman said.

Anchorage Bus Garage Burns; Damage, \$250,000

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — (AP) — Fire destroyed the Anchorage city transit bus garage Monday night causing damage estimated at \$250,000.

Lost in the fire were nine buses, including a reconditioned one which was scheduled to start the first Anchorage-Seward bus service tomorrow; one jeep, 17,000 pounds of new spare parts, a newly installed furnace, and the garage itself.

Employees saved four other buses by driving them from the garage.

Firemen said the fire apparently was started by a workman using an electric drill on a water-filled gas tank. A small quantity of gas left in the tank dripped on the drill and ignited it.

St. Louis Under Deepest Snow In 39 Years

ST. LOUIS — (AP) — St. Louis was buried under 11 inches of snow today in its greatest 24-hour snow storm in 39 years — the fifth heaviest in St. Louis history.

Traffic was stalled throughout the city and the snow continued to pile up at the rate of an inch an hour. The weather bureau saw little prospect of a lull later in the day.

One death was attributed to the storm. The state highway department reported eight to twenty inches of snow general throughout the southwestern portion of the state.

Schools were closed throughout the entire southwestern portion of the state and through bus schedules were cancelled.

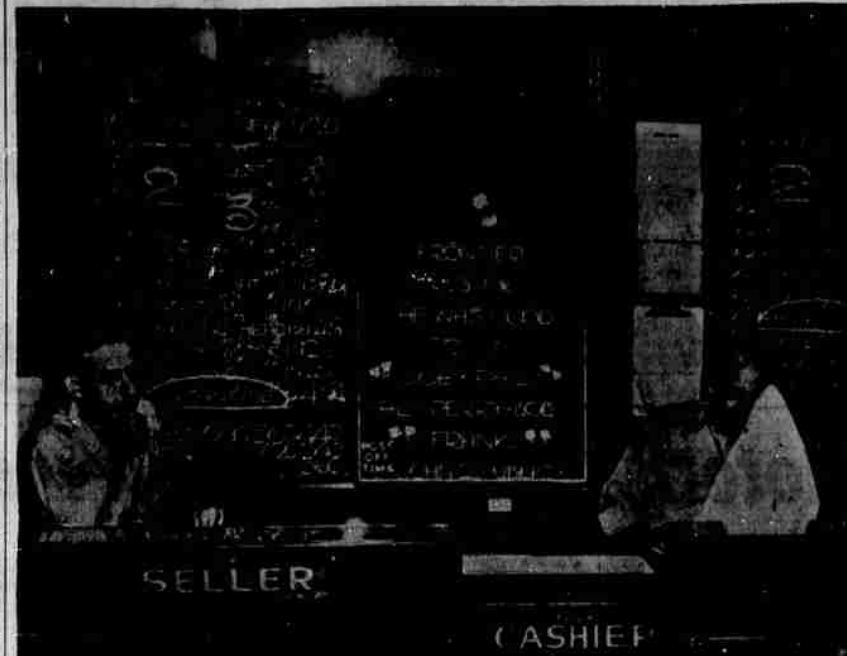

Boneless Beef Brisket Price Hike Authorized

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The government today authorized a 10 cents a pound increase in the price of boneless beef brisket — popularly sold as corned beef.

The Office of Price Stabilization said the increase is necessary to encourage retailers to continue to sell boneless brisket. It said ceilings set Oct. 1 did not allow butcher shops enough profit on the boneless product compared with unboned brisket.

The new price is effective at once. Boneless brisket accounts for about two percent of the meat in a beef carcass.

Liquor Prices Up In Legally Dry State

JACKSON, Miss. — (AP) — In legally dry Mississippi, the district Office of Price Stabilization has announced new ceiling prices on whiskey and wines.

Mississippi has a dry law on its statute books, but collects more than \$1,000,000 annually through a 10 percent levy on illegal liquor sales.

The law is referred to as the state's "black market tax."

The OPS granted the revisions to allow retailers to pass on to their customers new federal excise taxes.

Three Persons Feared Drowned In Netarts Bay

PORTLAND — (AP) — A man and a woman and a 17-year-old youth, all of Portland, were feared drowned Sunday in Netarts bay on the Oregon coast.

State police said Mrs. Edith Valow, 37; Walter Rylah, 41, and Vance Jones rented an outboard motor boat about 5 p.m. for a pleasure ride. When they failed to return at nightfall the coast guard was summoned, but the water was too rough to launch a vessel.

The boat was found later floating in the bay.

SLIGHT ERROR CORRECTED

NEW YORK — (AP) — British film actor James Mason's wife says she made an error — of \$40,000 — in figuring the value of jewelry stolen Sunday night from their hotel suite.

Mrs. Mason said that a miscalculation put the gems' value at \$30,000 when it should have been \$70,000. She said her Hollywood attorneys corrected her.

PURLOINING PUSS

ALHAMBRA, Calif. — (AP) — Mrs. Ethel Hoover's pet seven-toed cat, Sniffer, may get its name changed to "Swiper."

Mrs. Hoover said that Sniffer has been lifting things from the neighborhood for more than six months. She's kept busy returning gloves, rags and other articles and apologizing for her cat's actions.

Airliner Crashes, Breaks In Two; 1 Killed, 9 Hurt

TUCUMCARI, N. M. — (AP) — A twin-engine airliner loaded with 28 homeward-bound veterans of the Korean war crashed in a heavy snowstorm 100 yards short of Tucumcari airport Monday, killing one.

Six other veterans and the crew of three were hurt but none critically when the Martin 202 crashed, bounced and then broke in two.

Cpl. Donald E. Worman, 22, son of Mrs. Edwin Worman, Allentown, Pa., was killed.

Grenade Tinkering Kills Family Head, Injures 3

BON WIER, Tex. — (AP) — A local fisherman was killed and his wife and two children injured when the 39-year-old father attempted to open a hand grenade with a butcher knife at the family home.

Killed was James Dick, 6-year-old daughter, Bonnie Sue, was critically wounded. Mrs. Dick, 38, and a son J. W., 4, were less seriously injured in the explosion.

A third child, Willie, 12, was not injured. It was Willie who found the missile on a sand bar of the Sabine river near here.

The VA said that prior to passage of the new law, rehabilitation training was limited to veterans whose disabilities resulted from "armed conflict" or "extra hazardous" service, mainly those injured or disabled in Korea. The limitation barred many veterans from federally-sponsored training who had been disabled while serving in the United States or in non-combat zones.

The new act, known as public law 170, 82nd Congress, removes the "armed conflict" and "extra hazardous" requirements.

Under the new law, training may be extended to those veterans disabled in any part of the world after June 27, 1950, who were discharged under other-than-dishonorable conditions, have a compensable service-connected disability, and need rehabilitation training to overcome the handicap of their disability.

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Reconciliation Fails, Ex-Husband Kills Self

SEATTLE — (AP) — Unable to effect a reconciliation with his former wife, from whom he had been divorced three weeks, Fred Edward Miller, 40-year-old truck driver, shot and killed himself while he sat in the front seat of his car with her early Sunday.

He used a .22 caliber rifle. The ex-wife, Viola Miller, 29, said he told her he was going to give her "something to think about the rest of your life," then reached into the back seat for the rifle and took his own life.

The Millers have two small children living with the ex-Mrs. Miller's parents.

Annual Copco Operating Revenues Show Increase

PORTLAND — (AP) — An increase of \$958,699 in gross operating revenues for the year ending Oct. 31 was reported by the California Oregon Power company.

This year's revenues were \$11,734,788 compared with last year's \$10,776,089. A gain of 19 percent in power sales also was reported.
