Government Asks Spud Crop Boost

WASHINGTON — (AP) — For the first time in many years, the government is asking farmers to produce more potatoes.

The Agriculture department set a 1952 production goal of 350,000,000 bushels or about 13,000,000 more than this year's indicated crop. The 1950 crop was 439,000,000 bushels.

Until this year, production for many reasons has run far ahead of needs, resulting in surpluses which over a period of nearly 10 years has cost the government more than a half a billion dollars in price supports.

Price supports were abandoned this year. The result was a sharper reduction in planting.

The reduction has been followed by advances in prices. The 1952 planting goal was set at 1,565,000 acres for commercial production, or 5,000 more than this year's goal.

The acreage goal is merely advisory in nature. The acreage goals by states include: Idaho 137,500 acres; Washington, 31,300; Oregon 35,000, for early crop and in California 53,900.

Forest Products Market Report

Douglas fir sawlogs continued in good demand at steady prices in the Willamette Valley during the week ending November 3. Poles and piling and other forest products were also mainly steady, according to the weekly farm forest products report prepared from data supplied by the state board of forestry to the OSC extension service.

DOUGLAS FIR SAWLOGS: Douglas fir sawlogs continued in good demand in the Willamette valley last week. Second-growth logs over 24 feet long brought \$35 to \$38 a thousand board feet for No. 3's and \$45 to \$48 for No. 2's. Camp run logs were mostly \$40 to \$41 a thousand. 12 to 24 foot logs ranged from \$35 to \$46 a thousand. 8-foot logs down to 6 inch diameter continued strong at \$15 to \$18 a cord or \$32 to \$40 a thousand.

Old-growth sawlogs were steady at \$40 a thousand for No. 3's, \$50 for No. 2's, and \$60 for No. 1's. Peeleds were \$75 to \$110.

Second-growth Douglas fir stumpage offers ranged from \$12 to \$22 a thousand. Good winter shows were mostly around \$17 to \$18.

PULPWOOD: Northern and central valley pulp mills paid \$17 a cord for unpeeled spruce, hemlock, and true fir. Peeled, spruce brought \$20 a cord and other species brought \$19. Douglas fir was \$14 to \$17 a cord, unpeeled. A few mills are now buying Douglas fir by weight at \$5.90 a ton, which is about the same as cordwood prices. Peeled cottonwood was \$18 to \$19 a cord.

POLES AND PILING: Douglas fir poles and piling continued in good demand at steady prices. Barkie poles ranged from 7 cents a lineal foot for 25-foot poles up to 43 cents for 100-foot lengths. 40-foot poles were 13 to 18 cents a foot and 50-foot poles were quoted at 20 to 25 cents.

Peeled piling ranged from 25 to 42 cents a foot for 20 to 100 foot lengths. Demand was back for piling over 50 feet long.

HARDWOOD LOGS: Most hardwoods were steady at \$34.50 to \$37.50. A few mills paid up to \$45 a thousand. Cottonwood brought \$24 to \$30.

OTHER FOREST PRODUCTS: Hop poles continued in good demand in the central valley at \$1.25 to \$1.50 each for Douglas fir and \$1.75 to \$2.00 for cedar. Car stakes ranged from 40 cents each in the Eugene area to 50 cents in the Portland area.

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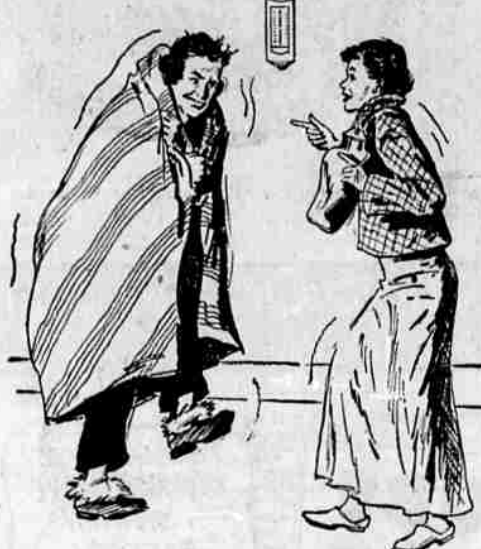
