

Cafe Anniversary Marked By Feed At 1939 Prices

TOLEDO, O. — (AP) — Toledoans lined up three deep Tuesday night to eat a club steak dinner for 85 cents, or a breaded pork chop dinner for 50 cents.

The occasion was the 12th anniversary of the Tick Tock restaurant. To mark the event, the management dug out the menu served on Nov. 6, 1939, prices and all, for just one day.

Twelve hundred persons slogged through snow and wind for lunch and an estimated 1300 jammed in for dinner.

They stowed away 120 pies, at 12 cents a cut; almost 1,000 pork chops, on the 30-cent plate lunch; about 200 pounds of beef, at 85 cents per broiled club steak.

Some of the other bargains: vegetable luncheon, 35 cents; cup of mushroom soup and minced ham sandwich, 25 cents; hamburger, 15 cents; roast beef sandwich with gravy, 25 cents; wiener on a bun, 12 cents.

Waitresses said 30 percent of the crowd were "strangers" and all big eaters.

Virginia Prosecutors Lose Out To Kinfolks

RICHMOND, Va. — (AP) — Commonwealth's attorneys (prosecutors) in two adjoining Virginia counties bowed in Tuesday's elections to their own kinfolks.

Lyon G. Tyler Jr., was knocked out of office in Charles City county by his cousin, J. Alfred Tyler, by a vote of 590 to 387. Both are descendants of President Tyler.

And in New Kent county, W. W. Richardson dislodged his distant cousin, Richard C. Richardson, by nine votes — 407 to 398.

Slot Machines' Outlawing Will Be Tried In Idaho

BOISE, Idaho — (AP) — A campaign to outlaw slot machines in Idaho is being considered by the Allied Civil Forces.

Harry Kessler, executive secretary of ACF, said the group would discuss next January the possibility of recirculating an initiative petition "if we can get the proper church organization back of us."

Given that kind of support, he said, "I think we can get them out of the state without any trouble."

Slot machines and punchboards are licensed in Idaho on a local option.

Anti-Hoarding Control List Adds 95 Products

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Ninety-five products, including collapsible tubes, aluminum foil, cans and many chemicals have been added to the government's "scarcity list" of items subject to anti-hoarding control.

The action, taken by the National Production Authority, puts users of the scarcity goods on notice that they may be penalized for accumulating them "in excess of the reasonable demands of business, personal or home consumption."

At the same time NPA removed from the list some materials in which shortages have eased. The list includes several building materials — cement, paper and pulp insulation materials, cast iron soil pipe, and gypsum board and lath — and some chemicals including industrial alcohol and titanium pigments.

Chemawa Indian School Head Given Bigger Post

SALEM — (AP) — Russell M. Kelley, Chemawa Indian school superintendent for the past four years, is to become director of Indian schools in Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan and North Dakota.

He will be succeeded at Chemawa by Martin S. Holm, now assistant director of Indian education in Alaska.

BOOKIE MYSTERY

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Police have checked on two of the 12 persons who bought the new \$50 federal bookie tax stamps.

At one place, officers said, they found only "two yelping dogs."

The other address was an apartment at the rear of a restaurant "operated by two nice ladies." No one was at home at either place when the officers called.

provisions for international inspections as "control without prohibition." The West already has rejected Russia's atom control plan, because Russia rejects the inspection clauses.

Vishinsky said the West's plan "truly seeks to prevent any sort of atomic control." Then he assailed a recent issue of Collier's magazine which he said had "outrageous illustrations" devoted to destruction by atomic bombs. This magazine was devoted to a fantasy by a group of writers, telling what might happen in World War III against Russia.

Acheson Replies Addressing the Russians, Acheson declared that achievement of an armistice in Korea "could open the door to broader consultations of other aspects of the Far Eastern situation." In addition he challenged Russia to: agree to impartial investigation of conditions for a free election in all Germany, agree on a peace settlement with Austria, withdraw objections to Italy as a U. N. member, and grant basic human rights to areas the U.S.S.R. controls.

Vishinsky had stock answers to most of these points, and as for the whole Western peace appeal, he had this to say: "I could hardly sleep all night last night because I could not keep from laughing. Even from this rostrum I cannot hold back my laughter."

Vishinsky called that Acheson speech "the same brand of ludicrous argument which will never fool the people of the world."

The Western governments, said Vishinsky, advertised a sensational peace plan and "gave birth to a dead mouse."

Portland Barbers Defier Hair Cut Price Increase

PORTLAND — (AP) — Union shops won't increase hair cut prices until their contract with barbers expires next July 1. That was the report of Charles T. Crane, AFL Barbers union secretary, who said the present \$1.25 price is stipulated in the contract.

At Oakland, Calif., the price already has increased to \$1.50 and a similar boost is scheduled in San Francisco Nov. 19.

Lost Plane Found In Oregon Region; 3 Doctors Dead

KLAMATH FALLS — (AP) — The wreckage of a private plane which carried three southern California physicians to their death last Saturday was reported found Wednesday near Paulina lake, according to word received from the scene by the Klamath air search and rescue unit headquarters here.

The bodies of the three men were aboard.

The plane disappeared Saturday afternoon shortly after taking off from the Redmond airport bound for Red Bluff, Calif.

Aboard were Dr. A. D. Myers of Baldwin Park, Calif., the pilot; Dr. Hugh Brown of Montebello, Calif., and Dr. Byron Baldwin of San Gabriel, Calif.

A report from Paulina lake lodge said a Sgt. Bailey of the air force found the wreckage, and ran back to the lodge to get help. The plane was found just a quarter mile from the lodge in the trees.

It was not far from the lake shore and only 50 feet from the main road into the resort area.

Clubs' Books Examined In Tax Fraud Charges

PORTLAND — (AP) — Books of three Portland clubs which formerly had slot machines, were used as a basis for tax fraud charges against two Portlanders, the local internal revenue collector said.

Hugh H. Earle, the collector, said that the Multnomah Athletic club, the Aero club and the Portland Golf club opened the books to investigators to show the receipts from slot machines and the percentage taken each month by the month by the machines owners, listed by the government as Lester T. Beckman and Robert B. Allan.

Last week federal indictments of Beckman and Allan were made public. Beckman was charged with 1945 and 1946 tax return falsification to avoid paying \$81,718. The charges against Allan covered the same period, and the sum was \$75,903.

Last April the government filed tax liens against the two men for back taxes, penalty and interest totaling about \$1,000,000.

TAXI FARES UPPED

PORTLAND — (AP) — It's going to cost more to ride taxicabs in Portland.

The city council has approved a rate increase which will permit taxis to charge 40 cents for the first one-fifth mile and 10 cents for each one-third mile after that. The present rate is 30 cents for the first fifth mile and 10 cents for each additional two fifths of a mile.

The new rates will go into effect about Nov. 15.

Girl Tells How Mother Slew Dad

SPOKANE — (AP) — A 14-year-old girl, her head bowed and her voice unsteady, testified against her mother in a second degree murder trial here.

"I saw my mother stick my father with a knife," said young Patricia Rock. Her mother, Mrs. Grace M. Rock, 38, sobbed. She is on trial for the fatal stabbing of Walter Rock, 33, in an apartment last Aug. 4.

"My parents were both drunk," Patricia testified. She said her father fell in a doorway after he was stabbed and said to her:

"Look what she has done to me now." The girl said she then ran for help.

Police officer Orville Gay testified that Mrs. Rock told him when he arrived to investigate that her

husband "had done it to himself — had fallen against the knife."

"Patricia spoke up then," Gay continued, "and said 'mother, there's no use lying. You know you did it.'"

Judge Ralph Edgerton denied defense motions for dismissal or modification of the charge of manslaughter.

EELS HALT POWER PORT TALBOT, Wales — (AP) — Eels from flooded brooks stopped production Tuesday night at huge Abbey steel works. The eels clogged pipes supplying water to cooling jets, and 250 tons of production were lost before they could be removed.

The Azores total 880 square miles in area.

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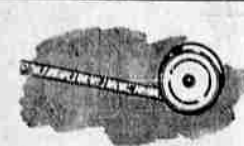
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
