Mrs. Elizabeth Rose, 75, well-known Roseburg resident, died early today following a prolonged illness.

She was born Nov. 23, 1875, at North Manchester, Ind., and came to Roseburg from Wisconsin in 1916. She was married to William E. Rose at Roseburg in 1916. He preceded her in death in 1925. Mrs. Rose was a member of the first Christian church here.

Surviving are six children: Marshall C. Fisher, Portland; Mrs. Merton (Wilma) Pugh, Vancouver, Wash.; Virgil E. Argos, Andrew D. and Oscar Fisher, all of Roseburg; two grandchildren, Lucille L. Hazell, Seattle, and Roy Meredith, Montreal.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the chapel of the Long and Orr mortuary, with the Rev. Rea V. Kleinfeldt of the First Christian church officiating. Concluding services and vault interment will follow in the Masonic cemetery.

Churchill Asks Americans For Financial Backing

can efforts to deter Communist aggression as "the main foundation of peace."

"I feel deep gratitude toward our great American ally," he said. "They have risen to the leadership of the world without any other ambition but to serve its highest causes faithfully."

The treasury official said the British request for aid would be made to the financial aid economic board (FEB) of the North Atlantic treaty organization, which is based in Paris. The plea will be for money rather than military goods and equipment, and the official said Britain also expected to share fully in the new \$4,800,000,000 military aid program authorized for Europe by Congress.

The request will be a reversal of the former Labor government's policy, which, after suspending Marshall aid last January, also decided to try to carry out its \$13 billion arms drive without American help.

But since then, Britain's economy has reached a critical low, because she has been unable to sell as much to hard currency countries as she has bought from them.

Churchill said his Conservative party was "shocked and surprised by the situation with which we were confronted after accepting responsibility a fortnight ago" following their general election victory.

"We have certainly been left a tangled web of commitments and shortages, the like of which I have never seen before, and I hope and pray we may be granted the wisdom and the strength to cope with them effectively," he declared.

Camas Valley Approves \$70,000 Building Bonds

Voters of the Camas Valley school district voted 3 to 1 to allow the district to contract a bonded indebtedness up to \$70,000 to construct, equip and furnish an addition to the existing building, and to make repairs in the present building.

The funds will specifically provide for three new class rooms and a cafeteria room, a new heating plant for the present building and addition, a bus garage, play shed and shop building, and the necessary repairs.

Approximately 60 percent of the registered voters of Camas Valley voted at the election. The bond bids will be opened Dec. 7.

Survivors Of Freighter Frown Home To Families

PORTLAND — (AP) — Most of the survivors of the freighter George Walton were home with their families today. Twenty-six of the 30 flew here yesterday afternoon.

All had tales of heroism to tell, repeating their stories told on landing at Port Angeles of the bravery and fine seamanship of the rescue crews which saved them after fire forced them from their ship. Two of the 30 were met at Port Angeles and drove down with their wives, and two were taken to a Seattle hospital. The rest mostly scattered to their homes here.

Some were under subpoena to testify in a routine coast guard investigation into the case of the fire. The quiz starts here Tuesday.

Troop Movements Are Not Planned

PARIS — (AP) — U. S. Army Secretary Frank C. Pace told the North Atlantic treaty nations today there are no plans at the moment to send additional American troops to Europe.

He appeared before a special committee of the North Atlantic treaty organization (NATO) to discuss American military and economic resources — both presently available and potential — in the buildup of western defenses.

He told the special committee that the six U. S. divisions now stationed in Germany would shortly be at full strength, and that there were no plans now to reinforce them.

U. S. strength in Germany is reported to be at five and a half divisions, with remaining elements enroute to make six full-strength divisions. Britain has four divisions in Germany, France has three and a half.

Mrs. Tom Bouse First Christmas Seal Buyer

Mrs. Tom Bouse of the Hotel Umpqua was the first person in Douglas county to purchase Christmas seals, reports Mrs. W. F. Amiot, executive secretary of the Douglas County Health and Tuberculosis association.

Mrs. Bouse obtained the seals early to send to her son, who is now serving in the armed forces in Korea.

She got ahead of George Kerby this year. Kerby, usually the first one on the spot, has also purchased his seals. A third person getting in early with purchases is Mrs. Irvin Meyer of 1034 E. Fifth Ave.

First Christmas seal bond, usually sold to business firms, was purchased this year by Associated Plywood Co.

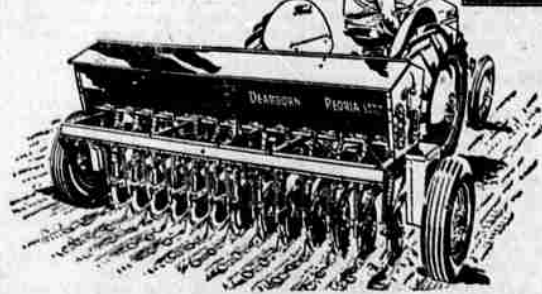
Mrs. Amiot said that the seals are being prepared for early mailing to Douglas county residents.

Israel And Syria Continue Dispute Over Border Zone

PARIS — (AP) — Lieut. Gen. William E. Riley, United Nations truce supervisor in Palestine, reported today he had been unable to end the dispute between Israel and Syria over control of the demilitarized border zone.

In another report, he said Israel and Syria were still at loggerheads over claims and counter-claims of truce violations in the Gaza area, near the Sinai peninsula.

However, Riley's reports showed that minor disagreements between Israel and Jordan and between Israel and Lebanon had been settled amicably by mixed armistice commissions.

Forget-Me-Nots Finance Welfare

Dean-Perrine chapter, Disabled American Veterans, finances its annual welfare program from receipts of its Forget-Me-Not sale, held annually. The sale started Friday and continues through today.

Last year \$1,029 was obtained in its sale of the familiar flowers. Disbursements, according to Commander Ray Lynes, included \$500 for payment on the DAV's lot. On national DAV Hospital day, last Sept. 3, members visited the Veterans hospital and distributed \$50 worth of cigarettes and \$27 worth of candy to the patients.

Welfare work during the flood, included distribution of \$375 for food, clothing and household items to victims. Christmas boxes were distributed to nine families, consisting of 16 adults and 30 children. Each box was valued at \$12.

Medicine costing \$4.50 was provided one family, groceries for a family of nine cost \$5, transportation for a veteran to the Vancouver hospital was \$4.25, cash assistance to five families, \$70; miscellaneous assistance amounted to \$8.

Other acts of charity were undertaken, including supplying of bedding and clothing furnished to three needy families because of fire losses.
