## CAMP FIRE COUNCIL ASKS FOR MORE LEADERS AND SPONSORS FOR CF

"Be Friendly — Make Friends — Join the Camp Fire Girls" — Roseburg has been hearing that slogan often lately as Camp Fire Girls have conducted their annual membership march.

This year the drive has paid special attention to the need for volunteer leaders. "In fact," Mrs. Morris Bowker, Council president, says, "we have a special slogan for our adult membership march. It's 'Hold that Line!'"

She explains that "Hold that Line" in Camp Fire jargon means that the organization's leadership line should remain unbroken.

In answer to the girls' plea to adults to "Hold that line" by continuing their volunteer leadership, 32 leaders have agreed to lead their groups this year. In addition, 47 new leaders have joined the agency. These leaders literally take in those from A to Z; Mrs. Chester Amundson is guardian of a Benson Camp Fire group and Mrs. William Zimmerman is a Blue Bird leader in Rose school.

At present, there are 60 groups of Blue Bird, Camp Fire Girls and Horizon Club girls in the Roseburg area, ranging in size from 9 to 29 girls. There has been a marked increase in membership in every school in the area. Last year there were two groups in Fullerton; this year there are six, with a total of 10 volunteer leaders. Glide has grown in Camp Fire membership from one group to three groups of Blue Birds and three groups of Camp Fire girls, with nine leaders.

The women who volunteer as Camp Fire Girl leaders are the

backbone of this youth program, according to Mrs. Bowker, and additional leaders are still needed. Fullerton fourth graders so far are unable to have a Blue Bird group, due to lack of leadership. A third grade Blue Bird leader is needed at Riverside. In addition, many assistants are needed.

"Each group must also have sponsors," continues Mrs. Bowker, "either men or women. You can understand now why we say that there's a place in Camp Fire for everyone."

"If you're a woman, you can contribute to the Camp Fire cause — and have a lot of fun besides — by becoming a leader. If you're a man, you needn't have a Camp Fire daughter or even a Camp Fire wife to become a sponsor or to serve on a committee," Mrs. Bowker said.

Camp Fire Girls have a saying: "Camp Fire is fun for everyone." And if anyone will telephone 3-8277 to offer her services to Roseburg's Camp Fire Girls, she will soon find it's absolutely true, according to Camp Fire leaders.

The other slogan, the one that guides the membership march, is "Be Friendly — Make Friends — Join the Camp Fire Girls!"
