

Confederate Flag Ordered Off U. S. Capitol Grounds

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A report that Confederate flags have been ordered off cars parked in the U. S. Capitol grounds came as a surprise to police.

Capt. Olin Cavness told newsmen he knows of no recent incident in

which a car sporting the Dixie battle banner was refused parking privileges.

A New York Times reporter said Capitol police have been ordering Confederate flag-bearers to haul in their colors while on the Capitol grounds.

"I don't say it didn't happen," said Cavness. "But I have not been able to find an officer who took such action."

There is a rule barring the display of flags, banners or devices to attract public notice on the Capitol grounds, he said.

But he added that he has not ordered his police to deny parking space to cars carrying the Confederate stars and bars.

The regulation, which has been on the books since 1882, has been enforced particularly when groups of Communists have attempted to stage demonstrations on the Capitol grounds in recent years.

It has also been used, police said, to require the removal of school banners and advertising signs from vehicles parking on the Capitol grounds.



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Grand Exalted Ruler Visits Local Elks Lodge Chapter

For the second time in 55 years the grand exalted ruler of the national Elks lodge will visit the local chapter.

Davis has been a member of the Elks for 41 years. In 1910, he joined lodge 173 in Williamsport, Penn. After serving in the chairs of his home lodge, he was elected exalted ruler in 1939.

Two years later he became district deputy and in the same year he was elected to the board of trustees of the Pennsylvania Elks state association.

Following his service on the board, Davis was elected vice-president and then president of the state association. In the ensuing years, he served on several grand lodge committees, and in 1943 he was elected grand esteemed leading knight.

Three years later he was elected to the board of grand trustees, on which he served until his election to the office of grand exalted ruler last July.

With his duties as an Elk official, Davis combined a successful newspaper career. He entered the newspaper business when he was 21 years old as copy boy on the editorial staff of Grit, the largest weekly newspaper in the United States. In 1937 he became managing editor, and held that post until he retired in 1949.

Banquet tickets will go on sale at the regular lodge meeting Thursday evening, Nov. 15, and will be available at the Elks club office thereafter.
