

U. S. Needs Renewed Spiritual Strength, Jurist Says

WALTHAM, Mass. — (AP) — Associate Justice William O. Douglas of the U. S. supreme court says the United States would probably be defeated in a global war if Asia should be swept into the political orbit of Soviet Russia.

In an address sponsored by Brandeis university, Douglas said that from the Asian viewpoint America "is losing its humanity and its idealism."

He called for a rebirth of American spiritual strength, saying: "If we are true to our traditions, if we are tolerant for a whole market place of ideas, we will always be strong."

He deplored the increasing attacks and limitation on civil liberties and warned that "our weakest grows when we become intolerant of opposing ideas, depart from our standards of civil liberties and borrow the policeman's philosophy from the enemy we defeat."

Douglas continued that "fear has driven more and more men in all walks of life to silence. Fear of losing one's job, of being investigated, of being pilloried has mounted."

There has never been, he said, a period of greater intolerance than we witness today in America.
