13 Negroes Arrested In Harlem Dope Raids

NEW YORK — (AP) — Detectives of the narcotics squad rounded up 13 persons Monday night and today in Harlem raids.

Police said two of those arrested sold narcotics from their apartment to addicts who blew toy whistles from the street to signal they wanted to buy dope.

The two were identified by police as Nathaniel Phillips, 28, and his brother, David, 26. They and the others arrested are Negroes.

Detectives said 21 teen-agers went to the Phillips apartment Monday night to buy dope but were turned away by the raiding police.

All those arrested were booked on charges of selling narcotics.

Damage Suit Against Lumber Co. On Trial

A damage suit against the Youngs Bay Lumber company went on trial Monday as the first civil case in the November jury term of the circuit court.

Vincent Spires, 20, is asking \$50,000 general and \$932.30 special damages in a sawmill accident resulting in amputation of a thumb and finger.

According to the complaint filed Sept. 10, the accident occurred when Spires' glove became caught in a trim saw machine.

A jury was selected and opening statements were heard Monday before the court recessed for the day.

U.S. Transport Plane, 4 Aboard, Disappears

FRANKFURT, Germany — (AP) A U. S. air force C-47 transport plane with four crewmen aboard vanished Monday en route from Bavaria to Belgrade. A mammoth air search was organized to comb the northern Adriatic sea, where it may have crash-landed.

The pilot's last emergency message, at 4:16 p.m. Monday, reported the plane was "low on fuel and I'm not sure I can make Venice or an emergency landing."

Carrying Concealed Weapons Jails 2 Youths
