Glide District Census Shows 852 Children

Census for Glide school district No. 12, just completed, shows a total of 852 children ages 4 to 20 years, reports Supt. Byron Evans. Supt. Evans believes this represents all the school children in the district. The count in 1950 was 704, but during the last year the population of the Glide district has greatly increased with the opening up of many logging and sawmill operations.

The census takers had quite a job on their hands, Evans commented. The newly consolidated district starts at South Deer Creek (taking in Dixonville), and includes Little River road area, Glide, Idlewild Park and east to Toketee falls. There are numerous side roads off the main roads, with cabins and trailer houses that could easily have been missed by the census takers, he said.

Taking the census were Mrs. Lynn Beckley, South Deer creek area; Mrs. Cecil Harris, Glide and Idlewild Park area, and Mrs. Phil Humphreys, Toketee falls area.

Accuracy important
It is vitally important that the rural school district obtain, as nearly as possible, an accurate figure of the potential school children, said Evans. The district receives an allocation from the state and county of approximately \$100 for each child, so a correct census is quite an equalization factor in determining the budget for the next school year, especially since Glide district contributes funds to assist the smaller districts in the county under the rural district program, he stressed.

Evans issued a request that parents whose children were not enumerated or persons knowing of children between the ages of 4 and 20 years (birthdays ranging between Oct. 26, 1931, and Oct. 25, 1947) who were residents of these communities on Oct. 25, 1951, call or write his office immediately so that a complete count can be obtained.

This census includes young people who may be attending college or who are in military service. It also includes married persons who are still under the age of 20 years.

Columbia Concert Trio To Appear Monday, Nov. 26

The Columbia Concert trio, in its fifth successful year before the public and playing an extensive coast to coast tour this season, will appear at the Junior high auditorium Monday, Nov. 26, at 8:15 p.m. in the first of the Roseburg Community concert series.

Violinist Mary Becker was born in Syracuse, New York, and had her first violin lesson at the age of ten. Her father, the late Prof. Conrad L. Becker, was a pupil of Joachim and head of the violin department of Syracuse university of College of Fine Arts. At 14, Miss Becker began her professional career and made five transcontinental tours before her New York Town Hall debut. Her teachers at the Juilliard Graduate school, where she later studied, were Albert Spalding and Paul Kochanski.

Cellist Ardyth Alton comes from Iowa. At 15 she won a scholarship at the Oberlin conservatory of music and on graduation, came to New York on a fellowship to the Juilliard graduate school.

She studied there under the distinguished cellist Felix Salmond. Since then she has appeared in recital as soloist with orchestra the length and breadth of this country and in Canada.
