Barbara Hutton Divorces No. 4; He Gets No Cash
NEW YORK — (AP) — The Daily News says a Paris court has granted dime store heiress Barbara Hutton a divorce "which will be good anywhere."
A Paris dispatch by Bernard Valery said the decree "awards not a nickel" of her fortune to dashing Lithuanian Prince Igor Troubetzkoy.
The official verdict was that the prince had left his wife "to suffer in loneliness," the story said.
The News said the decree supplemented "a wulckie decree obtained by Barbara in Cuernavaca, Mexico, which became final Aug. 25."
The heiress and the prince, her fourth husband, were married in 1947.
The story said Judge Jean Aussey assessed the prince the costs of the court action, about \$300.
Barbara has a son, Lance, 15, by a previous marriage to Danish Count Court Haugwitz Reventlow. They were married in Reno in 1935 and divorced in Denmark in 1941. The count was the heiress' second husband.
Her first husband was Georgian Prince Alexis Mdvani, whom she married in Paris in 1933. They were divorced in Reno in 1935.
The third marriage was to actor Cary Grant in 1942 in Los Angeles. They were divorced there in 1945.

Extortion Letters Halt Bones Intended For China

VANCOUVER, B. C. — (CP) — Bones of members of the Vancouver Chinese Benevolent association will no longer be buried in their native China.
"The outlook of our people has changed because of extortion letters," said Foon Sien, head of the society. "We used to collect bones of our dead every seven years for transport back to China — but not any more."
He announced that plans for burial here are being made for Leong Gun, 71. Gun hanged himself Thursday over threats to his wife and children near Canton, China.
Last shipment of bones to China was in 1932 and the war stopped shipments in 1939. There are 860 sacks of bones in the storehouse of the Chinese cemetery here.

Will Truman Run Again? He Keeps Everyone Guessing

KEY WEST, Fla. — (AP) — President Truman is keeping even his intimates puzzled over whether he will seek re-election.
His press secretary, Joseph Short, voiced officially what other White House aides have said off the record.
"Your guess is as good as mine." Nobody, even those who insisted Mr. Truman wants to throw the Democratic nomination to Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson of the United States professed to know whether Mr. Truman would accept it or whether he could win the nomination for the noted jurist.
The President, who says he won't reveal his intentions for 1952 until after he submits his three major messages to Congress in January, seems satisfied to keep everyone guessing.
He is concentrating, for the moment, on dominating the decisions of the party.
For instance, he told his last press conference that he will include his controversial "Fair Deal" domestic legislative program in his "State of the Union" message which he will deliver to Congress in January.
And, the President said with the spirit of the successful 1948 campaign, he could guarantee that the "Fair Deal" will be a part of the 1952 Democratic platform.
Most associates agree that the nomination of Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio by the Republicans would be the biggest inducement for Mr. Truman to run again.
