

Pastor's Heroic Trek Sends Aid In Plane Crash

CLE ELUM, — (P) — A young minister who walked barefooted 14 miles through snow and water to summon help after a Cascades plane crash called another man hero today.

The Rev. Harold W. Borhauer, 29, a Presbyterian minister from Wilbur, Wash., said a pilot, spotted by Paul Gemberling, 34, Spokane contractor, probably saved the three occupants of their plane when it crashed in the mountain wilds late Wednesday.

Borhauer said the plane was in a spin but Gemberling managed to straighten it out and bring it in "fairly level" just before the crash.

Gemberling was critically injured when the plane struck the ground. The Rev. Mr. Borhauer suffered broken ribs and an injured arm. Harold Lanphere, also of Wilbur, the third passenger, received a broken arm, head injuries and lost some teeth.

Rescue parties came out of the Cascade wilderness late Thursday night with Gemberling and Lanphere. The Rev. Borhauer had left them behind on the trail because of their injuries while he stumbled through deep snow and icy streams to find help.

State patrolmen, forestry men and loggers in the rescue party said they reached the injured men just in time. They had spent one night in the open and another might have proved fatal.

Half-frozen and with his feet badly cut and bruised, the Rev. Borhauer stumbled into a logging camp near Easton late Thursday. He had lost his shoes after he left the plane and his stockings were out as he dragged himself across the rugged terrain in search of help.

Federal Swat Spells End Of Business Firm

WASHINGTON — (P) — The government has cracked down on an Oakland, Calif., tire company which it said used about \$1,000,000 worth of excessive new rubber in seven months.

The Pacific Tire and Rubber Co. of Oakland, was ordered to stop immediately any further consumption of new rubber, either natural or synthetic.

This was the first announced action against the rubber industry for alleged violation of controls during the current mobilization program.

Officials of the National Production authority said the order, in effect, would put the company out of business.

Anti-Communists Seize Thailand's Government

BANGKOK — (P) — Thailanders awoke today to find that a military clique had abolished the constitution, dissolved parliament and seized control of the government in a bloodless overnight coup.

A nine-man "state temporary administrative body" ousted the former government, then reappointed Premier Pibulsonggram.

The coup was carried out in the oldtime tradition of pressure without bloodshed — in sharp contrast to the naval revolt last June and a coup in February, 1949.

The military clique announced it had acted in the interests of combatting communism.

Funeral Services Set For Clyde Henderson

Funeral services for Clyde G. Henderson, who died suddenly Monday morning in Sutherlin, will be held in the Sutherlin Grange hall Sunday at 2 p. m.

He was secretary-treasurer of the Grange for 17 years. At the time of his death, he was employed as a watchman for the Empire Lumber Co.

Survivors include several nieces and nephews in the Midwest.

Arrangements are in care of Stearns mortuary, Oakland.

American Jets Win War's Greatest Air Battle

No one guessed at how many more Red trucks might have passed on the roads without being spotted. Two thousand trucks are spotted on an average heavy night.

The Reds' phenomenal rush to build up supplies and presumably troops came as the ground fronts went through their third day of "twilight war" and Red truce negotiators again balked at guaranteeing against an increase in their forces during an armistice.

300 Trucks Destroyed
Returning pilots reported they destroyed 300 Red trucks and damaged an unestimated number.

FEAF suggested contributing factors to the unprecedented number of trucks could be (1) exceptionally clear weather and (2) such heavy damage to Communist rail lines that the Reds had to take to the highways.

Ground action remained quiet but the navy smashed at front line Reds. The heavy cruiser Rochester moved in close to the east coast Friday near Kosong, and fired her eight-inch shells at Red troop concentrations 11 miles inland. The cruiser's attack was screened by the destroyer Boyd.

In the same area the U. S. destroyer Marshall fired at Communist positions around the clock, touching off one large fire.

Most naval and air attacks — by both land and carrier based planes — were directed at Communist supplies, factories and rail lines. Rails were cut in 155 places by air attacks while other bombers hit five railway marshalling yards.

Meat Sale Exceeding Ceiling Draws \$250 Fine

SPOKANE — (P) — Mrs. Hazel B. Bruce was fined \$250 here on a charge of selling meat above ceiling prices set by the Office of Price Stabilization.

Mrs. Bruce, who had pleaded guilty, was former manager of the Burkhardt market that went out of business last month. Robert Hamilton, a meatcutter at her market, also pleaded guilty and was fined \$25.

Sentencing of the two disposed of the last of seven such OPS cases here, first to be brought to court in the country. Three cases were dismissed. One butcher paid a \$25 fine, another \$50 after they had pleaded guilty.

Price Rules' Observance Check Ordered By OPS

WASHINGTON — (P) — The government has ordered a nationwide check to see whether there is compliance with price regulations by such services as laundries, cleaning and repair shops, parking lots, golf courses and juke box operators.

Price Enforcement Director Edward P. Morgan said Office of Price Stabilization agents will check particularly to see whether prices have been posted as required and whether any firms have raised prices unlawfully.

Marijuana Sales In Schools Bring Charges, Advice

WICHITA FAS, Tex. — (P) — A grand jury, shocked at revelations of marijuana sales in Wichita Falls schools, had this advice for parents today:

Keep your children at home. Find entertainment and recreation for them there. Chaperone their gatherings.

Limit the amount of money given your children.

Limit the use for pleasure purposes of the family automobile.

Know where your children are and "not just think you know where they are."

With that advice, the jury indicted 10 persons on 21 counts in connection with marijuana sales in Wichita Falls schools.

Eight of those indicted are adults. The other two, although adults by legal definition, are high school students.

In all, 15 persons have been arrested. The other five are expected to be indicted in other cities.

WASHINGTON — (P) — The California Oregon Power company at Medford, Ore., has 60 days in which to tell the power commission why it does not have a federal license for its hydro-electric developments on the Klamath river in Oregon and California.

The commission asked the explanation as an outgrowth of the firm's application for a license for a new project, the Big Bend development, in Oregon.

The firm is operating other developments without proper licenses, the commission said.

The marijuana ring was uncovered recently by a young narcotics agent who enrolled in the high school. Within two weeks he had purchased about \$20,000 worth of marijuana with marked money. Authorities refused to identify him.

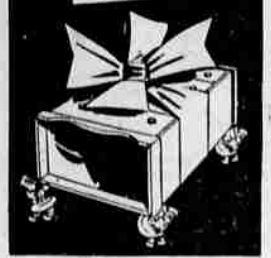
by the bureau, indicates that more rain is in store for the county. However, the storm front has

Taft Opposes Stassen For Minnesota Support

WASHINGTON — (P) — Senator Robert A. Taft has challenged former Gov. Harold E. Stassen's control of the Minnesota delegation to the 1952 GOP presidential nominating convention.

Taft told a reporter he has authorized Roy E. Dunn, Minnesota national committeeman, to conduct his campaign for delegates in Minnesota.

The Ohioan thus reversed the political field on Stassen, who challenged Taft's control of the Ohio delegation in 1948 and won nine delegates of the total of 53 assigned to that state in that year. Stassen did not try for all 53. Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York won the 1948 nomination, defeating both Taft and Stassen.

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
