

Mining Claims in Timberlands Rejected By BLM

PORTLAND — (AP) — The bureau of land management has refused to allow 43 mining claims of 160 acres each in timberlands near Randle, Wash.

Roscoe E. Bell, regional administrator for the bureau, declared the claims null and void. He said the claims were "ostensibly staked for the thin layers of pumice found in the Mt. St. Helens area." He noted that the claims covered 7160 acres of timber land in the Gifford Pinchot national forest.

He said there was only a thin layer of wet pumice in the area, not of sufficient quantity to warrant mining. He also said locations were not made properly and annual assessment work apparently was not done.

"Timber on the locations is of considerable value, and dubious mining claims on publicly owned timber lands are not very popular these days," he said.

Twenty Motion Pictures Foreclosed On By Bank

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — In an effort to recoup losses on loans to movie companies, the Bank of America has foreclosed mortgages of 20 motion picture films valued at \$25 million.

The films include "Arch of Triumph," with Charles Boyer, Ingrid Bergman and Charles Laughton; "Ramrod" with Joel McCrea and Veronica Lake, and "Body and Soul" with John Garfield and Lili Palmer.

These and five more valued at \$14 million were made by Enterprise productions, now defunct. The bank said yesterday it is considering possibilities of reselling the films in theaters or on television.

The Security-First National bank also took over eight pictures recently which had cost \$8 million to produce.

British Prime Minister Won't Be After Money

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Prime Minister Winston Churchill says he is not going to ask for money when he confers with President Truman here next month.

Informed sources said yesterday Churchill has no specific subjects in mind for discussion, but State department officials believe he may bring up:

1. Possibility of a meeting with Stalin.

2. Use of atomic weapons in any major war.

3. The whole strategy of the Russian problem.

4. British American partnership in world affairs. This could develop into talks about money.

However, Churchill has sent word he is not going to ask for financial assistance for his hard-pressed country.

Reconstruction Planned At Medford Army Camp

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The army said yesterday a little more than \$5 million will be spent in partial reconstruction of Camp White at Medford, Ore.

It will be part of a program to start soon at seven World War II training camps.

The army said about 2,200 acres of land would have to be acquired at each of the camps for troop housing and administration buildings for use in event of an emergency.

The seven camps were completely or partly disposed of after World War II. The camps will be maintained by small caretaker units so they can be expanded if a larger army is authorized, the army said.

Death Rate Of Wounded GIs In Korea Minimized

NEW YORK — (AP) — The death rate for battle-wounded Americans in Korea "is now approximately half that of World War Two," says Maj. Gen. George E. Armstrong, army surgeon general.

"Wounds of unprecedented severity are being survived with amazing regularity," Armstrong declared.

Wood, chairman of the army's medical research and development board, said 50 suits of armor have been tested successfully in Korea and that most of a regiment is expected to try the protective equipment soon.

The armor consists of eight-pound vests, made of layers of nylon or fiberglass cemented by plastics. The chest and abdomen are protected by the armor, reportedly capable of stopping missiles travelling 1,000 to 1,500 feet a second.
