

Plywood Co. Buys C. D. Johnson Co.

PORTLAND — (AP) — Georgia-Pacific Plywood company has bought two-thirds of the stock of C. D. Johnson Lumber corporation and expects to have virtually all of it — a \$16,800,000 deal — in a short time. Owen R. Cheatham, Georgia-Pacific president, made that report in a statement to stockholders received here.

His report said the purchase was at \$82 a share for the Johnson corporation stock. To finance the purchase, he said Georgia-Pacific arranged a 14-month loan of \$12,600,000 with the Bank of America and sold at \$20 a share 126,000 shares of Georgia-Pacific common stock.

Assets of the Johnson corporation include over \$6 million in cash and government bonds and nearly two and a half million in accounts receivable and inventory; nine hundred million feet of standing timber, mostly old-growth Douglas fir; and a large mill at Toledo, Ore., the report said.

Two of the Johnson corporation executives were killed in an August plane crash at Oakland, Calif., and arrangements for the sale were made in October.

State Dept. Aide To Head Rockefeller Foundation

NEW YORK — (AP) — Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk has been named president of the Rockefeller foundation.

Rusk's resignation from the government post is expected to be announced shortly.

Rusk is slated to take over one of the three largest foundations ever established in America.

He was named to succeed Chester I. Barnard, who reaches the mandatory retirement age of 65 next June.

The Rockefeller foundation has spent nearly half a billion since it was established in 1913 to support medical science, natural science, public health, social science and other endeavors.

The foundation's current assets of \$122,989,438 place it in the class with the Ford and Carnegie foundations. The Rockefeller foundation's expenditures, however, have been greater than those of the two larger foundations.

People Want Ike, Senators Of Both Parties Declare

EUGENE — (AP) — Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill) and Sen. Wayne Morse (R-Ore), both controversial figures in their political parties, think the American people want Gen. Dwight Eisenhower to be president.

At a joint press conference on the University of Oregon campus, Douglas was asked whom he thought the Republicans would nominate. He replied that "in their hearts the American people want General Eisenhower for President." Morse said he shared that view.

But Douglas added that GOP pose Eisenhower because they "professional politicians" would op- couldn't put him in their pocket."

When Morse was asked whom the Democrats likely would nominate, he replied that he thought President Truman "will not run—and I hope not — because another four years of Truman would cause serious disunity in the country."

Morse added: "I could mention some Republican leaders whose election would have the same effect. But I won't, out of party loyalty."

Of Mr. Truman, Douglas said: "He hates my guts — and maybe he's right in the weakness he sees in me." He has been a "pretty good president, but his great weakness is that he's not discriminating in choosing his friends."

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Ex-Librarian At OSC, Lucy M. Lewis, Dies

CORVALLIS — (AP) — The Oregon State college library director for some 25 years died here Wednesday.

She was Lucy M. Lewis, 72, who came here in 1911 as assistant librarian. Miss Lewis became librarian in 1920, retiring in 1945. From 1932 until her retirement she was also director of libraries for the state system of higher education.

She was named director emerita of the OSC library after her retirement. She had been ill for several months.
