Increased Supply Of Coins Foreseen By Treasury

WASHINGTON — (AP)—The treasury is beginning to see its way out of an acute shortage of coins. For months now, many stores and banks have been hard put for enough pennies and other coins to keep up with their transactions. They've had to resort to hasty borrowing from one another occasionally, and federal reserve banks have rationed some coins among member banks in their districts.

Leland Howard, assistant director of the mint, said today the coin supply is still "nip and tuck." But he added that, even with Christmas shopping under way, he thinks there will be enough coins to meet demands of the nation's expanding economy. He said that coin rationing by federal reserve banks is expected to end next month at the latest. The usual policy is to permit unlimited exchange of dollar bills for coins.

Here is how the situation developed and what the mint is doing about it, as outlined by Howard. It costs money to make money—25 cents for a pound of copper to make 145 pennies.

The mint asked Congress for an appropriation big enough to pay for producing 1,750,000,000 coins in the year which began July 1—an output that would have taken about 7,000 tons of metal.

But Congress allowed the mint funds for production of only 1,325,000,000 coins.

On top of that, nickel and copper are scarce defense materials, for one month, September, the mint couldn't get any copper at all to make pennies.

At the same time, the demand for coins has been increasing sharply. More states and cities are putting on sales taxes, and that takes more pennies. More and more buy-in of all sorts of things is being done through coin-operated vending machines.

Because of its shortage of funds and materials, and the growing demand, the mint couldn't turn out coins as fast as they were needed in the business marts.

The treasury appealed to citizens to turn in their piggy bank hoards of coins and get savings stamps or dollars instead. That brought a lot of coins out from hiding.

Vending machine operators, including cities which operated parking meters, were urged to empty their coin boxes more often to get the coins in circulation.

The mint stepped up production as fast as its budget would permit.

Reduced Bail Releases Eight Alleged Communists

LOS ANGELES — (AP)—Eight persons accused as Communists were released from jail here on bail ranging from \$5,000 to \$10,000 after a four-month fight against the \$50,000 originally set for each of them.

The eight included William Schneiderman, reported to be the acting head of the National Communist party at the time of his arrest. All are charged with conspiring to advocate revolution.

Three others were released previously on bail of \$5,000 each after the U. S. court of appeals in San Francisco ordered reduction of bail.
