## Abortion Death Leads To Arrest Of Chiropractor

ALBUQUERQUE — (AP) — A chiropractor is being held in county jail today on a warrant alleging murder in the abortion death of a 39-year-old librarian.

The warrant was issued for Dr. Paul Viperman, 52, in connection with the death of Mary Masterson, formerly of Roxbury, Mass. Viperman has denied any part in the affair and is being held under \$25,000 bond.

Miss Masterson's half-nude body was found in a vacant lot Friday. Viperman was identified as the man who performed the abortion by Sgt. Ralph Stelle Corbett of Sandia special weapons base. Corbett has been released to the custody of military authorities.

Corbett told police he and Miss Masterson started having dates last spring. She recently told him she was pregnant.

Miss Masterson came to Albuquerque 18 months ago to serve as librarian of the Ernie Pyle memorial library in the home of the late (Scripps-Howard) war correspondent.

She was a graduate of Boston Teachers college and received a master of library arts degree from Simmons college, Boston.

## Taft, Byrd Unite In Talks Against Administration

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Sen. Taft of Ohio says the federal government is threatening to "take over all welfare services through a scheme known as social insurance."

Taft, a candidate for the Republican presidential nomination, made the charge at a meeting of the American Medical association here. The session also was addressed by Sen. Byrd of Virginia, a Democrat who often opposes administration policies.

Taft told the doctors they are justified in opposing this trend "because the key move of the Socialists today is the effort to set up a federal system of socialized medicine."

Byrd warned that "if America is destroyed it will be the result of fiscal irresponsibility of which the present administration is guilty, and which even now is being exploited by political camp followers who would centralize a power and purse control in Washington."

Byrd earlier predicted the Democratic south may withhold its electoral college votes if President Truman is renominated.

The senator, long a foe of Truman, said that withholding of the south's electoral votes could throw a close election into the House of Representatives for selection of a President.
