During the meeting, pamphlets reporting the Nov. 8 decision of the Roseburg school directors were distributed. The decision is as follows:

"The school board of school district number 4, in light of recent developments... is now of the opinion that the proposed consolidation may not, at the present time, be to the best interests of either school district number or the districts involved."

"The board now plans to continue taking students from the outside districts, on a tuition basis for an additional year, that is, for the school year of 1952-53, or until such time as they are given at least one year's notice of discontinuance."

Final decision rests with the school districts at large, and elections will take place on Dec. 14. Polling place for school district 116 is the Dillard school auditorium, between the hours of 8 p.m. and 9 p.m. All legal, registered voters in the precinct are asked to get out and vote on that date.

X-Ray Program Is Considered At Meet Monday

More than 100 persons crowded into the new Woman's club house Monday to discuss the county-wide chest x-ray program planned Jan. 15.

Representatives from churches, sororities, clubs, labor unions, lodges, Granges, the Red Cross and public attended. Mayor Albert Giebel presided over the assembly. Mrs. W. F. Amiot, executive secretary of the Tuberculosis and Health association, said the meeting was "exceptionally well attended and the results were satisfying."

The meeting was called by the Douglas county Tuberculosis and Health association to organize and co-ordinate the chest x-ray program.

During the session the county was divided into five districts, and Ira Byrd was elected county

chairman of the drive, which has as its object the x-raying of all individuals 15 years of age and older.

Districts are: 1. Reedsport, including the area to Elkton; 2. Drain, Leona, Yoncalla, Scotts Valley, Wilbur, Winchester and Umpqua; 3. Glendale, Azalea, Canyonville and Myrtle Creek, and 5. Roseburg and all adjacent communities.

Chairmen of the districts are: 1. Mary Hunter; 2. Mrs. Hugh Whipple, temporary; 3. Lloyd Woods; 4. Mrs. Ted Rice, and 5. Mrs. Ialo Stephens.

Committees were appointed to determine the location of the x-rays in their localities, and the time they will remain.

Instead of five x-ray units as

originally planned, there will be six, and 20 technicians will be available to operate them.

Roy O. Young was appointed to administer the estate of James V. Conley who died in Roseburg Aug. 21. Ray Puckett was appointed appraiser.

Ex-Convict Held In Postal Theft

PORTLAND — (AP) — An ex-convict, accused in the disappearance of a \$20,000 McNary dam payroll, was expected to appear in Reno, Nev., today or tomorrow on a Post Office department request for removal to Oregon.

Stanley Smoot, Portland postal inspector, said the ex-convict, Walter R. Carroll, 51, was arrested in Reno on a charge of breaking into the Umatilla post office on Nov. 30, 1950.

That was the date the money, shipped from the Federal Reserve bank in Portland to the Inland Empire bank at Umatilla, disappeared en route, Smoot said. The money was to meet the payroll of a McNary dam contractor.

An earlier \$20,000 shipment in June, 1950, also disappeared en route, Smoot said.

Carroll was paroled from the Washington state penitentiary several years ago after serving a sentence on an armed robbery charge, the inspector said.
