

Charles Maxim

SAN FRANCISCO — (AP) — Former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles has finally convinced light heavyweight title holder Joe Maxim, after five beatings, that it is a hopeless cause to challenge him.

Charles, who confidently expects to punch the crown off Jersey Joe Walcott's head in their return fight early next year, dashed Maxim's hopes for a successful foray into the heavier division at the Cow Palace last night.

The lean Cincinnati Negro out-punched the 175-pound king to win an unanimous 12-round decision handily.

Crowd Boos
There were no knockdowns and not much sustained action. Neither was damaged or even in trouble. The crowd of 10,827 boomed at times in dull moments when Maxim engaged in his frequent clinches.

J C, Yoncalla Win AAU Games In Benson Gym

An Umpqua AAU double header basketball night at Benson gym Wednesday saw the favorites come through, but both the J C Sporting Goods team and Yoncalla were pressed hard by the underdogs.

The towering and experienced J.C.'s dumped Oakland 57-46, and Yoncalla waxed Glendale, 65-50. Both winning teams put on blistering drives in the last quarter to cop their wins.

In spite of fine floor play and fair shooting averages, the J.C.'s were leading by only three points at the end of the third quarter. Then, guard Les Winders and forward Bill Hubbard hit a hot streak to pull their team out of danger. Hubbard took individual honors with 15 points, while Winders was tied with Harold Smith of Oakland with 14 points. Winders did a commendable job as floor leader.

Yoncalla had to come from behind in the late stages of the first quarter to fashion its seemingly easy win. The Yones were trailing 9-2 at one point in the initial, but clutch scoring by Gerald Rust and Dick Strait put them into a lead often threatened but never relinquished. Strait led all scorers with 21 points. Harvey Stroud of Glendale was second with 17.

NEW SLANT

Players Entitled To Education, Officials Agree

WASHINGTON — (AP) — College presidents studying sports have found one point on which they're all agreed: they feel a college athlete is entitled to, and should get, a college education.

But as they went back to work today they still were far from a decision on what their chairman, Dr. John Hannah of Michigan State college, thinks is the heart of the problem.

"We still don't know how to control recruiting and subsidizing," he told reporters yesterday. "Spring practice, bowls, that sort of thing, are just the fringe."

In answer to a question, Hannah said yes, he thinks a player who has been recruited and subsidized is more likely to accept a bribe than one who never has received favors.

"Under this setup," he explained, "the boy is prevented from telling the truth. He's told not to answer certain questions. You've got a bad climate."

The college presidents are members of a special committee set up by the American Council on Education. They met here for a couple of days last month, and followed this up with a session yesterday and today.

Maxim, who whipped Irish Bob Murphy in defense of his championship a few months ago, is going to campaign in his own division. He said he was ready to take on the principal contenders, Harry (Kid) Matthews of Seattle or veteran Archie Moore of St. Louis anytime. "I want Matthews bad," he said. "I think San Francisco would go for this fight in a big way. We would get a lot of money for television."

Charles, keeping active until he gets his return title go, meets Joe Kahut of Oregon in a 10 rounder at Portland, Dec. 21.

2-Platoon, T-Formation Increases Grid Scores

NEW YORK — (AP) — Two-platoon and T-formation football have increased the scoring among college eleven almost two touchdowns a game and reduced shut-outs almost 50 percent, an Associated Press survey showed today.

In 1936, the first year of the Associated Press poll to determine the country's best teams, the average score of a game played by the better teams was 19 to 5. The top ten teams of 1951 romped over the grid-irons at a 28 to 6 pace, an increase of 13 points a game.

The 1936 eleven participated in 91 games and in 51 of them one of the teams failed to score. The leaders of the past season played 96 games and only 27 times was a team unable to gain the end zone.

TD's Were Scarce
The records of the ten colleges placing men on the 1951 All-America team were used in compiling figures for that year, the AP poll not making its debut until 1936. A quarter of a century ago the average score was 24 to 5. Touchdowns were scarce. In the 87 games played by the leaders that season, 51 teams failed to score.

Probably the most outstanding figure developed in the survey was

that which showed the increase in the length of the schedule. The 1925 leaders played 87 games, including Washington's 20 and 19 loss to Alabama in the Rose Bowl. The 1951 teams already have played 96 games and have six bowl appearances docketed for New Years day. However, the 1925 Washingtons played the longest schedule of any surveyed team, 12 games.

Kazmaier Reaps Honors

NEW YORK — (AP) — All-America Back of the Year, football player of the year, and now the star who dazzled them all in one big game.

We are referring, of course, to Princeton's Dick Kazmaier, whose sensational feats on the gridiron long will be remembered.

For his magnificent clutch showing against Cornell on Oct. 27 in the clash that had been rated the game of the day, Kazmaier was chosen as the player who turned in the most outstanding single performance of the recent football season.

In the Associated Press' poll of sportswriters and sportscasters to determine who had staged the greatest one-day show, Kazmaier's distinguished day against Cornell

was picked by 36 of the 102 poll participants.

Ran For Two TDs
Against Cornell, we ran for two touchdowns and passed for three others; he carried 18 times for 124 yards and completed 15 or 17 passes for another 236 yards. Final score: Princeton 53, Cornell 15.

Rated second in the poll was Fred Benners' amazing aerial exhibition for Southern Methodist against Notre Dame Oct. 13. Thirteen of the balloters picked that performance as tops.

All Benners did was complete 21 passes in 41 tries for 326 yards and all four touchdowns to defeat the Irish, 27-20.

Third went to Hugh McElhenny,

University of Washington's all-America fullback, for his spectacular show against UCLA. Hurry-in' Hugh scored all of the Huskies' points in the 20-20 tie, tallying the tying touchdown by grabbing a pass and hustling 25 yards for the six pointer in the final 65 seconds. Then the 200-pound star calmly converted for the equalizer.

McElhenny's exploits that day received eight nominations.

There were scattered votes for other "game" stars.
