White House Frowns On Truman Burlesque

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The White House thinks it would be "very bad taste" for the Pasadena Tournament of Roses to have a float showing President Truman playing the piano and "burlesquing mink coats and deep freezes."

The idea for the parade entry was advanced by the Junior chamber of commerce of Temple City, of the group, telegraphed the White House about the plan and asked for Mr. Truman's reaction.

Presidential Secretary Joseph Short wrote:

"In reply to your telegram of December seventh, it is suggested that most people viewing a float such as proposed in your wire would consider it in very bad taste."

Pelton Dam Opponents Referred To Interior Dept.

PORTLAND — (AP) — Bringing pressure to bear on the secretary of the Interior is the best way to halt construction of the controversial Pelton dam, members of the Irank Walton league were told here.

The league, an organization of sports fishermen, opposes the dam on the grounds it might harm fish runs in the Deschutes river. Portland General Electric company wants to build the dam to increase the northwest power supply.

Hollin E. Bowles, chairman of the league's Columbia river fisheries committee, said that league members should urge the secretary of Interior to hold up a certificate of necessity for the proposed dam. Without this certificate, the dam can't be built, he said.
