Smuggled Cigarets From U. S. Win Canadian Favor

ROUSES POINT, N. Y. — (AP) — Canadians' fondness for "smugs" is turning this bleak border region into the land of the fast buck. "Smugs" are smuggled American cigarettes. They sell for about 30 cents a pack in Canada, against 50 for the heavily taxed Canadian smokes. The popularity with the puffing public reached high into government. One member of Parliament, Leon Balcer of Three Rivers, Que., says seven of 10 members smoke smugs. Growing numbers of smugglers risk heavy penalties to spirit them across the border. Their forays are the modern echo of bootleggers' trucks that roared southward through this countryside during prohibition days. The border runners use countless side roads and remote trails. The woods are handy for caching large supplies of cigarettes. On both sides of the border, authorities are tightening their lines against the illegal traffic. The Royal Canadian mounted police have strengthened patrols and American customs men and police are cooperating with them. But millions of cigarettes get through. Falcon Island in the South Pacific disappears at intervals of years without regard for geographers. The scientific explanation is that Falcon Island is produced by intermittent eruptions of an underwater volcano.

**Union Officials
Escape Bullets**

HAZARD, Ky. — (AP) — Unknown gunmen have tried again to snuff out the life of Tom Raney, United Mine Workers official directing an organizing campaign in Leslie and Clay counties. Raney, UMW international representative, said he and two other organizers were fired upon from ambush Thursday night near Wootton, in Leslie county. Five bullets struck their car but Raney, T. N. Fleming of Jenkins and Bill Perkins of Hazard escaped injury. Raney said the shooting started when he stopped the car to look for another auto that had been trailing them. Machine-gun slugs fired from a passing car last Oct. 6 ripped into Raney's vehicle shortly after he and another man stepped out to enter a grocery at Stinnett in Leslie county. The gunmen never were found. After the Oct. 6 attempt on Raney's life, UMW Leader John L. Lewis asked Gov. Lawrence Welby to stop what he called a "reign of terror" directed at the union in the two counties.
