U. S. Production, Private Spending New Highs In '51

WASHINGTON (AP)—The American people produced more and spent more this year than in any other year in history and the new records probably will be broken in 1952, Secretary of Labor Tobin reported Wednesday night.

In a year-end report, Tobin said Americans saved more in 1951 than ever before—\$8 out of every \$100, as compared with \$5 out of every \$100 in 1950.

Total output of goods and services this year was nearly 10 per cent more than in 1950, Tobin said, and at least five per cent higher than the peak year of 1944. Tobin said employment reached an all time high of 62,600,000 in August.

Girl Dies Of Gun Wound Received Christmas Day

GRIDLEY, Calif. (AP)—Viola Gertrude Estes, 15, wounded by a shotgun blast while a bystander during a family argument Christmas day, died in a hospital Thursday.

Her stepfather, Allen Wesley Houston, 29, was held in the county jail at Oroville for investigation of assault with a deadly weapon.

Sheriff Leroy Gillick said the shotgun was discharged during an argument between Houston and the girl's own father, Emerson Estes. The blast struck Viola in the face.

Release Of U. S. Captives In China Urged By Senator

WASHINGTON — Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) has demanded that the U. S. Government, during Korea cease-fire negotiations, try to arrange the release of 363 Americans he says are prisoners in Communist China.

Knowland, in an exchange of correspondence which his office made public Wednesday, said he understands that 33 Americans are now jailed in China, 30 or more are under house arrest and 300 were refused exit visas when they tried to get out of the country.

In a telegram to Undersecretary of State James E. Webb, Knowland said he wants to know "specifically . . . whether or not the Department of State has taken steps in the current cease-fire negotiations to assure that the Americans . . . are able to leave Red China."

Webb had protested against Knowland's action in disclosing the names of 32 American citizens which the senator said are in Red Chinese jails.
