

### Roseburg Residents Hold Majority Of Stock In New Life Insurance Co. Granted Permit To Operate In Oregon

The American Guarantee Life Insurance Company of Portland, Ore., recently incorporated with Roseburg residents holding majority interest, has been granted a permit by the state insurance department to sell insurance in Oregon. This newly formed company will be the only old line legal reserve stock life insurance company with home offices in Oregon, it is reported. It is owned and operated entirely by people of Oregon.

The president of the firm, Albert G. Ingalls, was formerly president of the International Life Insurance Company of Phoenix, Ariz., which later moved to Austin, Texas. He has been in the insurance field since 1912.

The American Guarantee Life Insurance company is owned almost entirely by residents of Douglas county. Although the home office will be in Portland, a branch office will be set up in Roseburg as soon as suitable office space is found. Dale L. Woodruff, regional manager of southern Oregon, will be head of the local office. Assisting him will be Sam C. Campbell.

Directors of the American Guarantee Life Insurance Co. are: J. M. Housley, vice-president, former owner of the Valley Realty Co.; G. F. Reynolds, secretary, part owner in the Valley Realty Co.; Vernon Keel, director, owner of the Roseburg Studebaker agency; Hans T. Hansen, director, owner of the Roseburg Motor Company and the Hansen Motor company.

On the advisory board are C. M. McDermott, Dale Woodruff, Clifford Kluser, Ray Lehman and Clifford Collins, all of Roseburg. Robert Lovlien, formerly of Roseburg, has been appointed director of agencies and is now engaged in selecting agents throughout the state. Applications have been received from over 30 agents and new applications are being received daily, Lovlien says.

The company reports it is planning to issue a limited number of foundation policies. It will be a low cost policy available only to residents of this area. In addition to this special policy, the company will issue a complete line of regular life insurance policies, juvenile insurance, accident and health, and auto insurance.

The American Guarantee Life Insurance Co. plans to offer the very newest and most modern types of insurance. Among these will be a credit card type of hospitalization. This plan has never before been offered to the people of Oregon, company officers announce.

## Winnie Gets Late Start To America

### SOUTHAMPTON, Eng. (AP)—

The liner Queen Mary, carrying Prime Minister Winston Churchill to America for talks with President Truman, put out to sea three days late Monday.

Delayed first by the heaviest Atlantic storms in years and then by a balky anchor, the 81,000-ton luxury vessel finally got away at 11:38 a.m.

She originally had been scheduled to sail with her 1,104 passengers on Friday.

Churchill and his party of 35, including Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, had been waiting on board since 45 minutes after Saturday midnight.

Hope of sailing Sunday was dashed when the port anchor became jammed in its housing. Workmen had to cut through a plate into the housing to release the jammed fluke. Then they had to replace the plate.

guilty by a jury and sentenced by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly to serve three years in the Oregon state penitentiary. He was then placed on probation.

In the opinion of the supreme court, "On the trial no question was raised by the defendant but that the money in question was designed for a particular purpose and so received by him. But he did contend, and offered very substantial evidence in support of his position, that he was fully authorized to make temporary use of those funds for general lounge purposes, the only restriction being that the money so expended should later be replaced from lounge funds and paid over to the Post. The effect of the court's instruction was to eliminate this defense entirely.

"If he had authority to use entirely of his claims, or if, acting in good faith, he believed he had such authority and used the same with no intent to injure or defraud the Post or steal the money, he is not guilty of the crime of embezzlement in so doing, even though he might be liable civilly."

"The instruction, as applied to the facts in this case, was clearly erroneous and prejudicial."

## Truck License Accord Planned By 3 NW States

SALEM (AP)—Oregon, Washington and Idaho motor vehicle authorities will meet soon in an effort to extend the truck reciprocity agreement, Assistant Secretary of State William E. Healy said Monday.

Healy said that in the meantime, the truck reciprocity agreement, under which the states don't tax each others trucks, will be continued until January 15.

Idaho authorities served notice several weeks ago that Idaho is cancelling the agreement January 1 because a new state law forbids such agreements.

This would mean that other states would levy their license and other fees against Idaho Trucks, and that Idaho would similarly tax the trucks of the other states.

Healy said he believes that reciprocity can be continued even under the new Idaho law.

## Captain Staying With Mauled Ship

LONDON (AP)—Still clinging to his storm-cracked and wallowing ship in the Atlantic, Capt. Kurt Carlsen radioed Wednesday that he would stay aboard until he is towed to port or sinks. A new storm threatened.

Carlsen stood his watch alone through the fifth night since he ordered all others to abandon the American freighter Flying Enterprise and again reported by radio that he was in good spirits.

All ten passengers and 41 of the crew were believed to have been rescued after jumping into the sea last Friday. One crewman died.

Help was on the way today and old seadogs said the Enterprise had a sporting chance of being towed into port.

## Wrong Information Gets Doctor's Fracture Of Nose

NEW YORK (AP)—Edward Wilkins, 18, of Hoboken, N. J., was arraigned Wednesday, charged with breaking a Pennsylvania Station baggage man's nose in two places.
