

Illini Drubs Stanford Indians, 40-7; Volunteers Dumped By Terrapins

Ground Attack Proves Fatal To PC Team

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — The Rose Bowl game was over, and someone asked Ray Eliot, the Illinois coach, to compare the football played in the Big Ten and the Coast Conference.

The studious Eliot didn't crack a smile as he replied: "There actually isn't much difference in the brands. The Coast plays a grand game."

No doubt he was just being charitable. For he certainly wasn't looking the other way Tuesday as his ball club poured it on Stanford, 40-7, to give the Pacific Coast's best the sixth straight lacing in as many years in this post-season classic.

The well-trained, well-coached Illini kept Stanford off balance most of the afternoon. And when they finally pushed the Indians back on their heels for good, they staged the worst massacre the West has seen since Michigan steamrollered Southern California, 49-0, four years ago.

In nine minutes, 23 seconds of the fourth quarter, four touchdowns poured across. Up to then, the score was a respectable 13-7, the one touchdown margin most of the experts had predicted.

Illinois went 361 yards on the ground for an astounding average of seven per running play. By contrast, Stanford averaged less than a yard and a half per play on the ground.

All that kept Stanford in the ball game for three quarters was the strong right arm of Gary Kerkorian, who completed 11 of 22 passes for 166 yards. When he was injured in the final quarter, what fire Stanford had left died.

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Terps Rout Favored Vols In Big Upset

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Coach Jim Tatum taught his Maryland Terrapins lessons from the Tennessee school of football—lessons in waiting for the breaks—and those were the tactics Maryland used to start the rout of Tennessee and win the Sugar Bowl championship.

Tatum and Maryland didn't have to wait long Tuesday for those breaks against the national champions. They came in the first half and Maryland moved brilliantly forward to a 28-13 upset victory.

The smooth, even manner in which Maryland operated and the great wreckage it wrought on one of the highest regarded teams of the last 15 years, may prove to be a big factor in swinging more coaches and teams to the split T attack.

Maryland is the prime example of split T precision and power. Tennessee this season was the prime example of single wing power.

Fullback Ed Modzelewski ran behind Maryland's giant split T line as if it were a wall unpenetrable by the Tennesseans.

Modzelewski ran 28 times and gained 153 yards. The Vols could gain only 81.

Glide has a new head coach. He is Thomas J. Jones, a recent graduate from Oregon College of Education.

He joins the legion of new faces which have formed the 1951-52 coaching ranks. Jones replaces Harvey Stroud, who was dismissed from the teaching staff for dereliction.

Announcement of the engagement of the new mentor was received Tuesday from Glide Superintendent Byron Evans. Evans signed Jones after a flying trip to Eugene, Portland and Monmouth Saturday.

After his graduation from OCE in 1949, Jones taught and coached at Redmond for two years. According to information from Glide, the new mentor did not accept a coaching position this year because of a fear of being called back in the service. Instead he entered the University of Oregon to take several special courses.

Jones was in the Air corps during World War II and has since been in the reserve.

No definite date has been set for Jones' coaching tenure to start, but it will probably be almost immediately. He is presently moving his wife and two children to Glide from Cottage Grove.

Oregon Webfoots Beat College Of Pacific Five STOCKTON, Calif. (AP) — Burning speed plus a height advantage was the University of Oregon's combination for a 71-62 basketball victory over College of Pacific here Tuesday night.

The Webfoots scored their first goal when the game was two seconds old, added four more in a row and kept the pressure on until the final gun. They were ahead 33-22 at the half.

Chet Noe, six foot seven Oregon center, was the game's top scorer with 23 points. Bob Peterson, the Webfoots' high-scoring forward, had an off night and got only four points before he fouled out in the last quarter.

Bud Watkins, COP forward, was high for the losers with 19 points.

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It will be conducted exactly as the football poll with choices being made weekly by sportswriters and sportscasters over the state. The weekly poll will continue until the state tourney starts in March, according to Associated Press sportswriter Matt Kramer.

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Kansas Jayhawks Down Unbeaten Illinois Hoopsters

NEW YORK (AP) — Phog Allen's all conquering Kansas Jayhawks edged out undefeated Illinois as the national top-ranking college basketball team in the weekly Associated Press poll Wednesday.

Kansas, pride of the Big Seven received 31 first place votes to 23 for the Illini. The Jayhawks, triumphant in all 10 of their games, attracted a higher point total to shade the Big Ten stalwart, 751 to 739. Illinois' record is 7-0.

Huskies Named In all, 107 sports writers and broadcasters from coast to coast participated in the poll. Twenty of them named powerful Washington as the best team in the nation to keep the Huskies in third place. The Pacific Coast defending champions have a 10-1 mark.

Others to receive first place backing were Kentucky and Indiana six each, New York University five, Kansas State four, St. Louis and St. Bonaventure three, and Seton Hall, Murray State and West Virginia two each.

Kentucky, now 6-2, received 594 points to fall nearly 100 behind Washington's third place 688. The Wildcats barely managed to eke out fourth spot over unbeaten Indiana and NYU. The Hoosiers (7-0) beat out the New York Violets (12-0) for fifth, 588 to 545 points.

New York was followed by St. Louis, St. John's, Kansas State and St. Bonaventure in the first ten.

Teams in the second ten were Seton Hall, Iowa, LaSalle, Notre Dame, Oklahoma City, Murray (Ky.), North Carolina State, Utah, Syracuse and Michigan State.

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Parilli Sparks Wildcats To 20-7 Texas Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — Tennessee may be the nation's No. 1 collegiate football team but you would have a mighty tough job convincing either Maryland or Illinois.

The boys who operate the split-T formation for Coach Jim Tatum at Maryland have the figures to back up their argument. They soundly whipped Gen. Bob Neyland's Tennessee Volunteers 28-13 Tuesday in the Sugar Bowl at New Orleans.

Illinois, while not coming into direct contact with Tennessee, showed it has a pretty fair country outfit itself by walloping Stanford's Indians, 40-7 in the Rose Bowl. Victory by the Illini was expected but not by any such great margin.

Maryland ranked third in the Associated Press poll. Illinois was fourth, three notches above Stanford.

The Rose Bowl, granddaddy of all post-season gridiron classics, and the Sugar Bowl headed a nationwide card of 13 games which drew more than 400,000 fans.

The 1951 rankings can true to form in the Orange Bowl at Miami, Fla., where Georgia Tech (No. 5) edged Baylor (No. 9), 17-14 on Pepper Rodgers' 10-yard field goal in the closing minutes.
