

### Foreclosure On Note Is Ordered

A foreclosure was ordered Wednesday on property in the Sunset Homesites addition on default of payment of a promissory note by Harry F. and Dorothy E. Drulliner. The circuit court order states that the Drulliners are allegedly indebted to the Department of Veterans Affairs for the State of Oregon for \$5846.49 plus interest. ### Cruisers Will Become Guided Missile Craft

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy soon will begin converting two heavy cruisers into the world's first known guided missile warships.

It was learned Thursday the 13,500-ton Canberra and Boston, which have been in the mothball fleet, will sail from the West Coast, probably within a week, to East coast yards for a start on the remodeling.

An authoritative Navy source said the Navy expects that when extensive changes have been completed guided missiles for their main armament will be ready. This source declined to say how much time would be needed either for conversion of the cruisers or for perfection of missiles for their new era batteries.

### Federal Deficit Soars Fiscal Year's First Half

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government wound up the first half of this fiscal year \$7,467,242,215 in the red—a deficit about 13 times as big as that for the same period last year—the Treasury reported Thursday.

With defense spending up almost 300 per cent, the deficit was the biggest ever at the half year point, except for all-out war years.

Heavy income tax payments in the next few months, however, are now expected to reduce the year-end deficit to about six billion dollars.

**Diamond at Ashcraft Exhibit**

**The FLORENTINE**  
The Florentine, a diamond weighing 139.3 carats, was once sold for the equivalent of ten cents. It is an Indian diamond of odd shape and unusual cutting — a beautiful double rose-cut. It has 126 facets and the form of a star with nine rays. The Florentine has been owned by many famous persons and first enters history in the possession of the Grand Duke of Tuscany. Later it became part of the Austrian crown jewels. Charles the Bold lost it during the battle of Granson and it was found by a Swiss peasant who sold it for a florin.  
**The ORLOFF**  
The great diamonds of this world are as famous as the great men and women of history. Among the world's most expensive gems is the "Orloff," a diamond that weighs 185 carats and is cut in rose form.  
**The KOHINOOR**  
The Kohinoor, "The Mountain of Light" is the most famous diamond in history. According to legend, it was discovered in a river bed in India 500 years ago. It has been the center of bloody intrigue for centuries. Originally weighing 793 carats, the diamond was almost ruined by an unskilled Venetian diamond cutter in the sixteenth century, who reduced it to 186 carats in the cutting process. In 1850 the Kohinoor was presented to Queen Victoria who had it re-cut by the great Costar of Amsterdam. Though now weighing but 106 carats, it is now a perfect brilliant. The Kohinoor is preserved in Windsor castle.  
**The SHAH OF PERSIA**  
One of the world's most famous diamonds is the "Shah of Persia." Though this fabulous gem cost many men their lives, it also averted a war between Persia and Russia in 1829. On January 30 of that year the Russian ambassador to Persia was murdered in Teheran and was threatened by Russia as retaliation. The "Shah of Persia" was sent to the Czar at St. Petersburg by a special envoy as a gift of appeasement. Previous to its acquisition by Russia, the diamond had a long and checkered career, the important dates of which are engraved on the diamond itself. It is one of the few known engraved diamonds.
