

Oregon Beats 'Frisco Team In Tight Game

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Oregon used its fast break to crack the University of San Francisco's ball control defense Wednesday night as the Ducks rolled to a 55-49 basketball victory over the Dons.

The Ducks, hitting 48 per cent of their field shots, piled up a 38-22 halftime lead and held the edge despite a fourth quarter rally staged by the Dons.

Barney Holland, a reserve forward who hit three 25-foot shots, set the pace for Oregon during the first half drive, while Forward Bob Peterson and Center Chet Noe controlled the backboards for the Ducks throughout the game.

San Francisco's Center, Frank Evangelho was the leading scorer with 19 points. Ken Wagner got 12 for Oregon and Holland 11.

Oregon closes its road trip against San Jose Thursday night.

Beauchamp Paces Local Riflemen

Harold Beauchamp paced the shooting in the weekly Roseburg Rifle club shoot at the Roseburg armory Wednesday night by firing a 381 out of a possible 400. Dean Paulson was a close second with 378.

This was the last inter club shoot before a series of shootoffs with other clubs in the Oregon-California league. Called the Postal league, the Roseburg shooters will vie with 12 other clubs in northern California and southern Oregon. Next Wednesday, the squad meets Scotts Valley.

BAKER (AP) — A \$51,000 personal injury suit was filed Wednesday by a man who said he was hit by an oil truck and as a result couldn't play basketball for two months. Playing basketball, the complaint said, was his means of livelihood.

Spartans Nip Notre Dame In Upset Win

Michigan State upset Notre Dame 66-52, and St. Louis, the Sugar Bowl tourney champion, had to go overtime to beat Houston, 64-57.

These were the chief developments in collegiate basketball Wednesday night.

Texas Christian opened the Southwest Conference season by whipping Southern Methodist, 58-43. On the Pacific Coast Oregon took San Francisco, 55-49, and St. Mary's edged Santa Clara, 54-53.

Favorite Bounced

Playing at home Notre Dame favored to knock Michigan State out of the unbeaten ranks. But the Spartans chalking up their 7th in a row put on a second half drive that killed all chance for the Irish. It was Notre Dame's first home defeat since Iowa won on Dec. 19, 1949.

St. Louis ranked 4th in this week's Associated Press poll, came on to whip Houston, 64-57 in overtime.

Fordham surprised by invading Raleigh, N. C. and beating North Carolina State, 62-59, in another overtime fray.

The touring Pennsylvania and Dartmouth teams both were beaten. Duke defeated Penn, 62-52. Dartmouth put up a valiant struggle against Bowling Green at Toledo, but faded in the second half and lost 76-68.

Bates Appointed Cage Official Of District 9

Bates has been president of the Umpqua Valley league since its inception late in 1950. It was largely through his efforts that the league was begun and his appointment as commissioner visibly pleased him. Stanford Receives Big Share Of Net

PASADENA, Calif. — Stanford's Indians took a 40-7 pasting in the Rose Bowl but they will get about twice as much money as victorious Illinois, when the spoils are distributed several weeks hence.

After taxes, expenses of the game and stadium rental, the net will be about \$380,000, and the Big Ten and Pacific Coast Conferences divide it equally.

Stanford gets a flat \$60,000, plus \$2,000 traveling expenses. The PCC treasury receives \$25,000 and the remaining \$203,000 or so is divided among the nine conference schools. Stanford included about \$22,500 each, Stanford therefore gets about \$85,000, minus expenses.

Illinois' expenses figure at about \$20,000, so \$270,000 will be split 12 ways in the Big Ten conference. Illinois figures to get about \$45,000, plus expenses.
