Frank Alfred Futrell, 65, died at Douglas Community hospital in Roseburg early today. Born May 1, 1886, at Lutsy, Mo., he came to Roseburg six years ago. He was a resident of route 1, box 925, and was engaged in the logging business.

Surviving are the widow, Edna; three sons, Jack of Roseburg; Richard of Wenatchee, Wash.; and Willard of Florida; one daughter, Mrs. John (Leola) Wilhite of Roseburg; three sisters, Mrs. Jim (Lula) Wynneburner, Mrs. Ray (Mattie) Connelly and Mrs. Nannie Bacon, all of Tulsa, Okla., and six grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 3 p.m. at the Chapel of the Roses, Roseburg Funeral home, with the Rev. Forrest Hill of the Nazarene church officiating. Interment will follow in Civil Bend Cemetery.

Narcotics Raids Staged In Several Large Cities

NEW YORK (AP)—Federal narcotics agents and local police swooped down on suspected dope peddlers and addicts in several of the nation's major cities Friday.

Raids in New York City, Buffalo, San Antonio, Tex., and Detroit were staged simultaneously. Officials called it "the biggest roundup

of suspected dope peddlers and users" ever staged in some areas. More arrests are expected. Approximately 50 persons, some of them said to be major figures in illegal sales of narcotics, were seized in New York City.

Eisenhower Won't Run, Stockman's Opinion

PORTLAND (AP)—Rep. Lowell Stockman (R.-Ore.) believes Gen. Dwight Eisenhower will not run for President this year.

Stockman predicted that Sen. Robert Taft (R.-Ohio) would win the Republican nomination and go on to win the presidency.

"Gen. Eisenhower will not run on any party's ticket. He's too engrossed in building up military security in Europe," Stockman said.

New Drouth Record Set

10. The weather cannot be overlooked in spotlighting 1951 news events. A 96-day drouth, broken by only .06 inches of rain Aug. 28, broke all previous records. The previous record of rainless days was 78. The drouth, which followed a relatively dry spring, was significant in that Douglas county's vast reserve of timber was like a tinder box, resulting in numerous, hard-to-control fires. Another weather record was set, when wind velocity reached 40 miles an hour with gusts up to 65 MPH on Dec. 4. The previous record in Roseburg's low wind-velocity area was 38 MPH. Considerable wind damage resulted over the county.

While the foregoing are rated as top selections, numerous other events of top interest occurred in 1951. That year saw a change in city managements, with resignation of M. W. Slankard and the appointment of W. A. Gilchrist. Slankard was Roseburg's first city manager and remained more than three years in office.

There was also a change in police chiefs with the resignation of Calvin Baird and eventual appointment of Ted Mazac. Numerous police department changeovers occurred because of unsatisfactory pay.

East Lane and South Main street storm sewers were installed and plans laid for North Jackson and West Roseburg storm sewers. The Roseburg city budget was defeated but subsequently passed without change upon a second vote. The first million dollar school budget for district 4 was passed.

Other Projects Started

The year 1951 also saw the start of drilling for oil in Coles Valley; a switchover from manual to dial telephones; laying of plans for a 1952 Centennial celebration; start of construction of Rosewood Homes, Inc., housing project of 30 duplexes west of Fullerton school, and the appointment of a supervisor, Charles Collins, to head the county parks department.

Major controversy was the Martin Brothers Box Co. strike, which idled 500 employees of the plant at Oakland from March 23 until June 11.

Partial return to a wartime footing came with the organization of a Civilian Defense setup, headed in the county by Brig. Gen. J. T. Pierce, Ret., and in Roseburg by Col. Medorem Crawford, Ret., with component units.

Heading the list of many tragedies was the burning to death of little Patricia Mathis on Nov. 8, when her clothing was ignited by a flare pot in North Roseburg, and the death of her father, John Edward Mathis, in a woods accident a week later. A couple burned to death at Myrtle Creek and a fire fighter met his death in a flaming forest.

Camas Valley District Plans School Additions

Pay Increase For Armed Forces Will Be Sought

WASHINGTON (AP)—Legislation giving all members of the Armed Forces a 10 per cent increase may get a high priority in the session of Congress convening next Tuesday.

The increase would be given to everyone in uniform, from the lowest ranking private to the highest general. It would apply not only to pay but also to subsistence and quarters allowances. It would not be retroactive.

Retired service personnel also would receive the increase.

Once in a while during the long coma, Raymond smiled, wept or turned a little on his bed toward someone who was talking to him. All his food was taken either through a tube or intravenously.

Religious Picture Shown Rotarians

The course of religion since its inception was shown Rotarians Thursday noon in a colored motion picture presented by Dr. Morris Roach.

Members of the Roseburg Rotary club were shown the film during the Civic Room of the Umpqua hotel.

Beginning with Christ's birth and crucifixion, the film revealed the struggles of religion until dissatisfaction with Christian policies in England and Europe drove different nationalities to the United States.

In scenes employing artistic drawings instead of actual actors, the impact of Luther's religious conceptions and other religious highlights were vividly depicted.

The film was adapted from the book, "Fire Upon the Earth."

Steelworkers Defer Strike For 45 Days

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—The CIO United Steelworkers Friday postponed their threatened nationwide strike for 45 days but warned they will walk out in late February if the government can't settle the steel contract dispute.

Cheering delegates to a special USW convention approved a recommendation of the union's top strategists that the work stoppage be held off to give the Wage Stabilization Board time to suggest a settlement.
