U. S. Farmers, Mexicans Talk On Harvest Help

MEXICO CITY (AP)—Mexican and U.S. farmers will try to agree next week on conditions for the shipment of Mexican harvest hands to the U.S. for temporary work.

The agreement, if reached, will then go to their governments for guidance.

The practical level talks between the farmers will come just a few days before the government negotiations begin. The present pact which permits Mexicans to go to the U.S. for temporary harvest work will expire Feb. 11.

White Potatoes Due To Go Under Price Controls

WASHINGTON (AP)—The government said Thursday an order to slap price controls on white potatoes has been completed but no decision has been reached as to when it will be issued.

An Office of Price Stabilization aide said the regulation could be issued "on short notice." Potato prices have been rising rapidly since September.

Price Director Michael V. DiSalle told reporters the order has not yet come to his desk.

An Idaho delegation arranged to see DiSalle to protest the proposed order.

OPS officials said the regulation being held on standby basis would allow perhaps 10 to 15 days before its effective date to give the industry time to make adjustments to meet the ceilings.

An official said the ceilings would be set at a level to meet all legal requirements of the Defense Production Act and assure a parity price to growers. He said there would be a cushion between the ceilings and parity to allow for packaging, handling and marketing expense.

He said also that ceilings would permit price differentials for grades and different areas of production.

Mounting Bank Activities Reflect Production Speed, Higher Wages And Salaries

NEW YORK (AP)—The rising flood of money in the nation is shown strikingly as the banks report on their year's activities. There's money everywhere — except when it's time to pay the first of the month's bills.

Most banks report higher deposits, greater resources, larger volume of loans, bigger interest payment totals to savers, much bigger payments to the tax collectors, and in most cases higher profits.

The dollars the banks deal in can buy only a little more than half as much in goods and services as they did before World War II. But they are still dollars—and every other country in the world is just as anxious to get their hands on more American dollars as you are.

The stepped-up activity of the nation's banks in almost every one of their departments and services is a reflection of the pace the nation is going in production, in spending, in expanding plants. It also reflects higher wages and salaries.

The banks made many more loans in 1951 than they did the year before. Their total now to business, industry and agriculture is more than 21 1/2 billion dollars. This is a gain of three and three quarters billion dollars in a year. Most bankers think the total will increase as the nation borrows to expand its defense plants.

Bond Cashing Tops Sales

On these loans the banks are getting higher interest than they did a year ago—three per cent or better now, compared with 2 1/4 per cent a year ago.

One reason the interest rate has gone up—according to the National City Bank of New York's January bank letter, out Thursday—is that the Federal Reserve Board is anxious to check the rise of the money supply in this country, if it can and is making it harder for the banks themselves to get cheap money.

One form of personal saving showed a decline last year. Savings Bond redemptions topped sales by more than one and a half billion dollars.

Woman Pilot Leads Red Raid On Inchon Base

TOKYO (AP)—A "woman pilot hero" led the Communist air raid on Inchon Harbor Wednesday, the Pyongyang radio said.

The North Korean high command said Red bombers attacked Inchon and Kimpo Air Base, destroying 24 U.N. aircraft in the Kimpo raid.

The Red radio broadcast a dispatch from a Communist correspondent saying "Woman Pilot Hero Tae Son Hi" led the Red bombers which "dropped every bomb over the enemy marshalling yard on the Inchon Harbor. All bombs got their targets."

The broadcast continued: "After recognizing the enemy weapon warehouses were wrapped in flames, the woman hero turned her planes' head to the base. All bombers returned safely."

New Checking System Begun At State Prison

SALEM (AP)—A new system of checking on prisoners at the state penitentiary was being put into effect Wednesday, Prison Warden Virgil O'Malley announced.

O'Malley said the new system is needed because the old count system apparently didn't work. He was referring to the fact that Kenneth O. Smith, Salem burglar, walked out of the prison Sunday afternoon, and it was eight hours before guards knew he was missing.

Fake Dimes From Oregon's Prison Found On User

SALEM (AP)—State Police, investigating reports that counterfeit dimes were coming from the state penitentiary, found 16 of the fake coins Thursday on the common-law wife of a prisoner, State Police Capt. Ray Howard said.

Howard said his men picked up Lucy McGinnis Jackson, 42, and that she said she got them from Dewey Jackson, Polk County murderer under life sentence.

Howard said Jackson claimed he found 50 counterfeit dimes on the prison farm while he was fixing a fence, and that he gave them to the woman.

Howard said no charges have been filed, and that the case is being turned over to the U.S. Secret Service.

Prison Warden Virgil O'Malley said he would make no comment until the investigation is completed.

Yule Week's Business Failures Show Increase

NEW YORK (AP)—Business failures in the Christmas week totalled 163 compared with 117 in the preceding week and 125 a year ago, Dun & Bradstreet reported Thursday. Failures involving liabilities of five thousand dollars or more totaled 124 against 92 in the previous week and 105 last year.
