Britain To Pay U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States Monday collects its first installment on the 1946 British loan of three and three quarter billion dollars.

The payment, the first to become due over the next 50 years, will amount to almost 139 million dollars. The British owe the U.S. an additional \$602,899,000 for World War II aid, and this has been added to the 1946 loan at 2 per cent interest.

Social Security Rules Listed For Self-Employed

"If you work for yourself and are planning to include your name on the quarterly social security tax return you will file in January for your employees—don't." So

says Claude E. Dawson, manager of the Eugene social security office.

Dawson says that many self-employed businessmen who were brought under social security by the 1950 amendments are under the same impression that they should report their net income quarterly in the same manner that their employees are reported. That isn't correct. Self-employed people report their own net earnings for social security purposes only once a year, at the end of the year when they make their individual income tax returns.

Everyone who has net earnings of \$400 or more in a year from trade or business covered by the Social Security Act must make the annual self-employment return and pay the self-employment tax. A form for making the return should be secured through the nearest office of the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

Although self-employed people do not make returns until early in 1952, Dawson stated that they will receive social security credit for their 1951 earnings just as do employees whose wages are reported quarterly by their employers.

SPOT ADVICE
AVOID ALCOHOLIC STAINS
The morning after the night before is hardly the time to be full of rules and cautions. Still, clothes do mean a lot of money, and we all want to keep unnecessary expenditures to a minimum. So, if you can save a garment, hooray for you!

In terms of New Year's Eve parties, there is one stain that's always outstanding, frequent, numerous and sizeable . . . the alcoholic stain.

Right here let us say this:

BRING ALL GARMENTS WHICH HAVE BEEN STAINED DURING NEW YEAR'S PARTIES IN TO BE CLEANED RIGHT AWAY.

In about 99 cases out of 100, the stains will be from alcoholic drinks. Alcohol, being a "semi-dry" liquid, is extremely volatile. In addition, most dyes are soluble to a lesser or greater degree in alcohol.

Which simply means that ALCOHOL TENDS TO LOOSEN OR DESTROY DYES.

SO THE SOONER YOU BRING THOSE GARMENTS IN, THE LESS RISK YOU TAKE OF DAMAGING THEM BEYOND REPAIR OR RESTORATION.

And on cellulose acetate materials, remember that alcohol tends to dissolve the fibers of the fabric. There is nothing which can be done about this. Just try to be careful and not spill anything alcoholic on a rayon or cellulose acetate garment.
