Russian Band To Play At GI-Backed Sports

VIENNA, Austria (AP)—In an unprecedented display of international friendship, the Russians in Vienna agreed Wednesday to send a soldier band and folk-dancing team to an American-sponsored sports event.
In a last minute acceptance, the Russians sent a representative to American Army headquarters here to say they would send a band and 67-man folk dancing group to the event.
It was believed to be the first time in the six year history of four power occupation in Vienna that the Russians had agreed to send their troops to a GI affair.

Oregon Grange Master McClure Again Chosen

PORTLAND (AP)—Elmer McClure, Milwaukie, will continue as Oregon State Grange Master for another two-year term.
His re-election was announced here Tuesday. He was unopposed in the Grange primary election.
The office of overseer—the Grange's second highest office—is being contested and there will be a run-off. W. G. Howes got 3585 votes in the primary, and will be opposed by Vern W. Lantz, Redmond, who got 3118.
