Harry Bridges' Appeal In Perjury Case Filed

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Attorneys have filed a 93-page brief supporting West Coast Longshore Leader Harry Bridges' appeal from a perjury-conspiracy conviction. The brief was filed for Bridges and two co-defendants in the 1950 conviction in the Ninth U. S. Court of Appeals Wednesday.

The brief asserts Federal Judge George B. Harris, the trial judge, favored the government against Bridges and "deprived appellants of a fair trial."

Bridges, head of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Union (Ind) and Union associates J. R. Robertson and Harry Schmidt were convicted of plotting to help Bridges swear he was not a Communist at a 1945 naturalization hearing.
