Roseburg Puts On Basketball Show Friday

Early Willamette Lead Nullified; Nolte Sparks Teammates To Victory

"The loss at Myrtle Point did them good."

This was Coach Dick Ballantyne's reaction to his Roseburg Indians' 40-28 cross-county victory at Eugene Friday night over the Willamette High School Wolverines.

The Indians put on their best basketball performance of the year in every department. A height difference gave the Indians an edge they took full advantage of. Their fast break was working like a charm. And long-distance shooting was effective.

It looked bad in the first two minutes of the game as the hosts ran up a 6-1 lead, but the Indians were just getting the feel of the court. Ed Nolte set the spark for the drive that was to run the Wolverines off the court. He sank a long two-handed set shot and his fellow Indians took the cue. They started intercepting Willamette passes to break up their opponents fast break, and unleashed a fast break of their own that couldn't go wrong.

By the end of the first quarter, the Indians nullified the Wolverine lead and moved ahead, 11-9. They added an airtight defense in the second quarter that completely blanketed Willamette, while the Indians ran up a 12-point bulge. When Willamette changed to a zone defense in the second half, the Indians started shooting over it and kept the lead fluctuating between 12 and 16 points. This forced the hosts back to a man-to-man to which the Indians rebutted with their effective fast break.

Roseburg's major forte was defense, and Harold Backen was a tower in this department. Replacing Bruce Dalros, who was out with a sprained ankle, Backen did himself proud in holding high scoring Gunnar Christiansen to a dwindling nine points.

Nolte's Showing Surprise
He joined big Jim Gilbert and diminutive Ed Nolte to blanket the boards. Little five-foot eight-inch Nolte was the surprise package of the evening. In spite of his height, he was a tiger on the boards. In the first half, he recovered as many rebounds as any other man on the floor. With their tentlike defense, the Indians held the Wolverines to their smallest score in two years. The losers picked up only three baskets in the entire first half.

Ralph Rudzik, the fireball Kansas transfer, paced Roseburg's fast break which all but swept the hosts off the floor. He joined with Le Roy Elting to rack up well over half the Indian score. Elting led scorers with 17 points and Rudzik had 10.

Walter Livingstone, venerable athletic director at Denison University at Granville, O., struck the keynote when he asked:

"They're anxious to take over control of athletics—but are they also willing to take over the financing of the athletic programs?"

The report by the 11 college presidents gave birth to many varied interpretations among the not-too-big athletic chiefs. Among them were:

That it will kill the NCAA as a legislative body; that the presidents have attempted in a six-day meeting to solve problems confronting athletic directors for 50 years; that nothing will come of it; that it will be a long time before

Actually, the House of David squad showed no more trickery in the offensive in-fighting than did the J Cs, but the long range bombardment by Tom Gatzek, Gene Foutz and Homer Garner leveled the J C defenses.

A shot by towering Jack Loomis put the J Cs ahead 2-0 and the Roseburg squad could treasure that as its only lead. Garner tied it up and then hit a long one to put the Davids ahead, 4-2. Garner and Gatzek then teamed up with a howitzer exhibition that gave their team a 20-point lead by halftime and a 23-point, 50-27, pace by the three-quarter mark.

That cleared the ground for some fourth-quarter antics that the sparse crowd was waiting for. A regular football and baseball routine was included in the list of tricks, but it was the imprudent stock that tickled the crowd. One
