Three-year-old Judith Gorman, of Houston, Texas, has been battling polio two-thirds of her life. After she was stricken two years ago, she went home from the hospital with braces and crutches. Now she's back at the Southwestern Polio Myelitis Respiratory Center in Houston for an operation which doctors hope will help. The center is one of several sponsored by the March of Dimes for respiratory polio cases.

### Overthrow Plot Jails Yugoslavs

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — Five Yugoslavs, two of them former high government officials, pleaded guilty to plotting the overthrow of Premier Marshall Tito's government and were sentenced to prison Friday.

Borba, organ of Tito's government, said all five were acting for the Soviet-led Cominform which ousted Communist Yugoslavia in June, 1948, because it refused to follow Russian policies.

Vojislav Szentice, former deputy economic planner, got a 15-year sentence from the district court.

He was arrested last June, reportedly while he and his wife were trying to flee the country. Szentice was said to have passed the Soviet Union information on Yugoslav negotiations for U.S. economic and military aid.

His wife, Dragica, one-time foreign ministry official who decided on appointment of officials to other countries, was given a 10-year sentence.

Milka Zicina, one of the country's best known woman authors, was sentenced to eight years.
