

Ducks Meet Washington This Week

A collision between defending champion Washington and undefeated Oregon highlights play in the tightening Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference basketball race this week.

Washington, No. 6 in the Associated Press poll last week and regarded as probable repeat division champion, will be host to the Ducks in a crucial series at Seattle Friday and Saturday.

With two wins and no losses for the season, the Ducks will need only one victory to retain first place in the division, while the Huskies need to sweep the series to knock the Oregonians out of the top berth.

In other games this week, Washington State plays Idaho at Pullman Monday night and is host to Oregon State Friday and Saturday. WSC defeated Idaho 62-46 in the series opener last Saturday.

Washington will go against Oregon minus Bob Houbregs, the hookshot specialist sidelined with a leg injury. Houbregs also was out of the lineup in the Huskies' series with Oregon State last Friday and Saturday but Washington, playing a ball control game, dropped the Beavers twice, 46-37 and 49-41.

Duane Enochs took over for Houbregs and led the Huskies in scoring and teamed with Doug McClary to control the backboards.

Washington State, which had lost three of its first four games on the road, trailed Idaho 28-30 at the halftime but pulled far out in front in the last two quarters. WSC's Eric Roberts led the scoring with 25 points.

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (AP)—Bing Crosby's National Pro-Amateur Golf Tournament, a \$10,000 event with a million dollar cast, goes down in sports history as the battle of the big wind, torrential rains and a fruitless struggle with par.

Colorful Jimmy Demaret, the transplanted Texan now operating out of Ojai, Calif., won the abbreviated event Sunday with a 36-hole total of 145. It was a one-over-par figure.

The victory was worth \$2,000. He pocketed an additional \$500 by finishing third in the pro-amateur competition with Comedian Bob Hope. They scored a best-ball of 70-64-134.

Two teams tied for low in the pro-amateur best ball with 133. They were Bob Toski, Northampton, Mass., and Dr. Bob Knutson, San Francisco, with 70-63 and Art Bell and William Hoelle, both San Francisco, with 68-65.

Lowest money winners among the pros were those with 152.

Skiers, Skaters Bolster Chances Of Olympic Win

OSLO — The United States' hopes of finishing high in the winter Olympics at Oslo next month were bolstered over the weekend by the showing of Uncle Sam's women skiers and men skaters in three international meets.

The women skiers made the best showing as 23-year-old Jeannette Burr of Seattle and 19-year-old Andrea Lead Lawrence of Rutland, Vt., finished one-two in the Swiss National Women's Ski Championship at Grindelwald.

And at Trondheim, Norway, Ken Henry of Chicago won the 500-meter speed skating race with Johnny Werket of Minneapolis second. Werket also finished third in the 1,500-meter race and ninth in the 10,000, won by the Norwegian ace, Hjalmar Andersen. Henry was eighth in the 1,500.

Miss Burr, named to the U.S. team without competing in qualifying tests won the Swiss title with a point total of 1.33 on the basis of a second in the down hill race and fifth in the slalom.

Mrs. Lawrence was third in the down hill and second in the slalom for a total of 1.91 points in the field of more than 50 competitors. Mrs. Lawrence also won the separate giant slalom race Saturday.

"This is the first time in history that American skiers have made such a showing in international competition," said Mrs. Gretchen Fraser of Vancouver, Wash., manager of the U.S. team and herself the only American medal winner in skiing four years ago. "The field here was nearly as good as that we'll encounter in Norway. It indicates we'll have a team to reckon with at Oslo."

Jack Reddish of Salt Lake City, figured to be the United States' best bet for Olympic points in the men's slalom competition finished 14th.

Reddish also turned in good time for the slalom, 2:01.5, but was disqualified for missing a gate on the steep, zigzag course.

Football Problems Under Scrutiny Of National College Athletic Assoc.

WHITE SULPHUR SPRINGS, W. Va. (AP)—"There seems to be continued questions concerning the relative merits of the platoon system versus restricted substitution," said a recent questionnaire to college football coaches.

The rules committee of the NCAA starts wrestling Monday with an answer to the question for 1952.

The substitution rule and other proposed changes will be debated Monday and Tuesday and acted upon finally Wednesday.

The coaches replying to the questionnaire sent out by their own rules committee voted overwhelmingly, 357, to 106, to keep the present system of unlimited substitution every time the ball changes sides.

However, athletic directors, conference officials and high school coaches have a say in the final authority — the NCAA rules committee, headed by H. O. Fritz Crisler, of Michigan.

Urges Change

One of the conference representatives is Frank G. McCormick from the Pacific, which tried unsuccessfully at Cincinnati last week to have the NCAA convention urge a change in the liberal substitution rule.

The coaches favoring restrictions were asked to pick one of five proposed methods, which is indicative of the number which might be tossed at the Rules Committee here.

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Athletic Problems Slated For More Intense Study

CINCINNATI (AP)—The nation's colleges moved into the cleanup phase of their controversial athletic programs Monday wielding a whisk broom instead of a pick axe.

Out of the maelstrom of resolutions, counter resolutions and academic double talk marking the 46th National Collegiate Athletic Association Convention last week, these facts emerged crystal clear:

1. The NCAA plans to attack the evils in its sports setup in a calculated, unyielding manner, ignoring the prod of a special presidents committee to go in and chop away. A year's study was prescribed for such issues as bowl games and subsidization practices.

2. All factions—the NCAA, presidents and football coaches—found one solid starting point for the cleanup program. That is, a national standard of entrance requirements and strict university control of all athletic policies.

Emerges Stronger

3. The NCAA emerged from the crises stronger than ever before, strengthened by the support of the dissident Southern bloc which a year ago perpetrated the death of the sanity code. The South and Southwest backed the NCAA solidly in its refusal to be spurred into drastic action by the presidents' committee.

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College Circuits Following Form In League Games

Except for the Pacific Coast Conference and the Ivy League, the college basketball circuits have been going—surprisingly enough—very much according to form.

On the Pacific Coast, Stanford, the pre-season favorite, is riding along in second place in the Southern Division with two beatings. In the Northern Division, Washington, which was figured as the logical champion, also is in second place with one defeat.

However, this one should straighten itself out in the coming weeks, because the overall marks of both schools point up the fact that they're far away from their brothers' universities. Stanford's mark is 12-3 and Washington's 12-2. Meanwhile, however, Oregon heads the northern section and UCLA the southern.

In the Ivy League, it appears that defending champion Columbia is going to find the going tough. The Lions had lost three games before they started loan operations and were promptly plastered with a 68-65 defeat by Cornell Saturday night—their first in the league since 1950.

The others—the Big Ten, Big Seven, Southwest, Southern, Southeastern, Missouri Valley and Skyline—all are following the form chart.

Meanwhile, two more unbeaten bid the dust. Seton Hall bowed to Siena, 55-52, after winning 12 straight and Florida, which had won 10, was trounced by Kentucky, 89-52. Earlier in the week, Syracuse and Indiana were dropped for the first time.
