Louis Barred From Golf Meet

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — A SAN JOE LOUIS was barred from the Professional Golfers Association Monday over its rule prohibiting him and other Negroes from tournament play.

The long-standing PGA rule against non-white players fell on Louis when he arrived Sunday for this week's San Diego Open.

Local tournament officials said the PGA rule, which they declared they had learned about only two days ago, would bar the former heavyweight boxing champion and two other Negroes—Bill Spiller and Eural Clark, Los Angeles professionals.

The usually mild-speaking Louis denounced the rule as un-American and declared PGA President Horton Smith was "another Hitler" in enforcing it.

"Horton Smith believes in the white race like Hitler believed in the super-race," he said.

Livestockmen Set Annual Meet Here Jan. 18

Livestockmen will assemble at the Knights of Pythias Hall in Roseburg, Friday, January 18, at 10 a.m., for their annual meeting, according to J. Roland Parker, secretary.

Specialists in breeding, feeding, forage and pasture crops and disease control are among speakers to discuss problems with livestock owners.

Joe B. Johnson professor of animal husbandry at Oregon State College will explain the results of progeny testing experiments at the college and results of feeding and pasture studies. Desirable and promising forage and pasture plants will be described by H. H. Rampton associate agronomist of the United States Department of Agriculture. Dr. J. N. Shaw will explain the purpose of the new animal disease laboratory being established at the college and discuss control of livestock disease common to Western Oregon.

Over 50 percent of the annual cash agricultural income of the county comes from the sale of livestock and livestock products according to J. Roland Parker county agent. Income from sheep and wool alone in 1951 reached an all-time high of nearly \$2,500,000. Further growth in the livestock income appears possible by improvement of pastures for carrying a greater number of livestock and through improving the quality of breeding stock.

Carrying capacity of native pastures in the county is less than half that secured by stockmen on improved pastures. Improved pastures not only have increased the carrying capacity but has resulted in better quality market animals and heavier weights at marketing time.

Republicans Gain Vote By Competence Ruling

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Now that he has been declared legally competent, John Michael Haggerty, 101, can go to the polls next election and "vote for Taft and Warren."

The judge complimented Haggerty on his physical appearance in Superior Court Thursday. The centenarian attributed it to abstinence from coffee, tea and hard liquor. He said he voted for President William Howard Taft and wants to cast a ballot for his son.

Haggerty was adjudged incompetent in 1934, but his niece and guardian certified that he is now capable of handling his own affairs.

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A cable showed police his cigarette lighter, fused with a .38 bullet, and said it had cost him \$25, but saved his life.

Joseph Falkowich's story, as verified by police:

A holdup man, dressed as a be-ribboned Army captain, robbed him of \$25 early Friday then drew:

"I'm sorry, but I'm going to have to put you to sleep."

At a range of only 18 inches he fired. The bullet crashed into the lighter in Falkowich's shirt pocket and stunned him.

The robber shoved the cable into the street; fled in the taxi.

Grazing Lands Upkeep Topic For Meet Here

Farmers and stockmen having trouble with weeds and brush on crop and grazing lands will be given an opportunity to learn the latest in chemical control next Wednesday at the Knights of Pythias Hall in Roseburg starting at 10 a.m.

Rex Warren crops and weed specialist, Oregon State College, has been secured by county extension agent J. Roland Parker to discuss weed and brush control with local landowners. The number of chemicals for weed and brush control is growing rapidly and are or will be available through the dealers, Parker said.

Success in use of chemicals for

the control of weeds and brush depends largely on the selection of the right chemical, proper timing of the application and thoroughness of application. Chemicals are now being used to control weeds in field and garden crops. Hand weeding in strawberry fields and row crops has been largely eliminated through use of newly developed weedicides, he said.

Brush of different kinds as well as certain trees have been difficult to kill with chemicals available in past years. New chemicals are now available that will give 90 to 100 per cent kill when used properly and are found to be no more expensive than slashing and burning.

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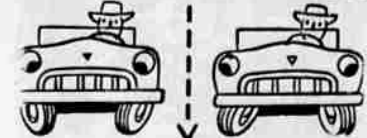
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
