The modern scientists, doctors and psychologists, have proved beyond a doubt that music can make life easier and more pleasant for everybody. They've found that stomach ulcers and other disorders aggravated by worry and nervousness are helped by the quieting influence of music. Hospitals use it to calm patients before surgery. Dentists find it relieves tension of patients in their chairs. It's even been found that lively music can offset fatigue and make the subject actually stronger.

All the therapeutic benefits of music are heightened, researchers say, if the subject makes the music himself. Actually creating the music provides the most effective outlet for emotional tension.
