SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Home state foes of Gov. Earl Warren proceeded Tuesday with their campaign to oppose his bid for the Republican presidential nomination.

An insurgent party action instructed a four-man executive committee to organize a state of national convention delegates led by Rep. Thomas Werdel of Bakersfield.

Regular Republican leaders within the state are supporting a slate pledged to Warren. The third-term governor was chairman of California delegations in 1936, 1944 and 1948.

Speakers at an anti-Warren rally Monday night complained that the governor was more a Democrat than a Republican.

**Pope Urges Social
Reform On Nobility**

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Pius Monday urged members of Rome's nobility to devote themselves to social reform and to realize that "a page of history has been turned."

Receiving the noble families in a traditional annual audience, the Pope said:

"Italy's new constitution no longer recognizes you as a social class, or as having, in the state and among the people, a particular mission, attribute or privilege."

"A page of history has been turned, a chapter has been closed. A period has been jotted, marking the end of a social and economic past."

"A new chapter has been opened that heralds very different forms of life. One may think of one wishes, but that is the fact."

**State Labor Bureau
Suing 41 Employers**

SALEM (AP) — Oregon workers filed claims with the state Bureau of Labor for \$54,385 in unpaid wages in the past six months, State Labor Commissioner W. E. Kimsey said Tuesday.

They were filed by 42 workers. Kimsey's office has collected \$7,561 of that amount, and has started legal action against 41 employers.

The biggest claim, for \$4,350, was filed by an industrial plant manager. The smallest claim for \$1.66 was filed by a bean picker.
