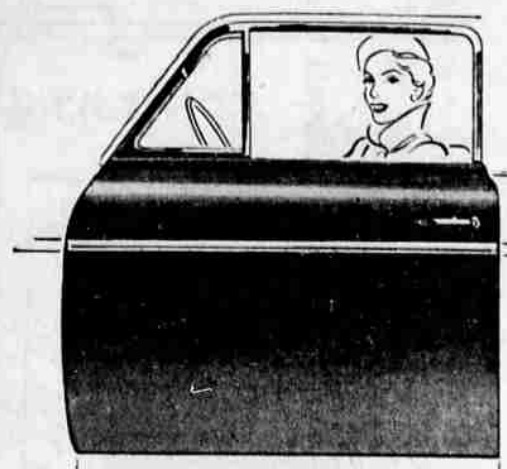

The Sutherlin Bulldogs astounded a crowd of home town fans by battling the heavily-favored Roseburg Indians down to the wire before finally succumbing 38-32, in the last minute and a half of a District 5 contest.

The Bulldogs turned a psychological advantage into their best game of the season and had the Indians reeling on the ropes before the visitors wrapped up the game in the waning seconds. What makes the result more amazing is the fact that the hosts had been consistently beaten by county "B" schools and had their only win in seven games over the Roseburg Junior Varsity.

Coach Anderson's charges bounced into a light 9-7 first quarter lead and still had a thin, 14-13 edge at halftime. They led through the entire first half.

The Indians, paced by Bruce Dalros and LeRoy Elting, pulled away in the third quarter to a 31-22 lead and the Roseburg signs of relief were almost audible. But it was too soon to chalk up a win. The Bulldogs boomed back in the game and with less than a minute and a half to go, Kenny Wahl sank a shot to bring the score to 33-32.

Tips In — Roseburg's bulwark, Bruce Dalros, pulled the Indians out of danger with a tip in. Bud Backen boosted the lead to 36-32 with a foul shot, and Ralph Rudzik insured the victory with a shot just before the gun. This evened the Roseburg record at six wins and six losses.

Kenny Wahl of Sutherlin and Dalros of Roseburg proved to be the powers on their respective teams. Each scored 13 points. LeRoy Elting was a close second with 11 tallies. Dalros and Elting were almost wholly responsible for the third quarter drive which served as a buffer against the fourth-quarter Sutherlin onslaught. Dalros picked up 6 in this quarter and Elting added 8.

Louis Wins Fight With Golf Assoc.
SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Former Heavyweight Boxing Champion Joe Louis was the winner in his fight to gain Professional Golf Association approval to play in the San Diego Open Tournament Thursday.

Louis claimed it made him the first Negro, amateur or professional, to gain such approval.

The decision to accept his entry as an invited amateur was announced Tuesday night by Horton Smith, PGA president.

Louis was paired with Smith and another PGA national committee member, Leland Gibson of Kansas City as a starting threesome Thursday. Smith also announced that a PGA ban would stand against another Negro, Los Angeles professional Bill Spiller.

He said Spiller lacked PGA approval as a professional and also was subject to a long-standing tradition based on the PGA by-law that all members must be white.

Louis said he would play, even though Spiller was ruled out, but that he would continue his fight to gain equal rights for Negroes in golf.

"This is only the first round," he declared.

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Saner Levels Predicted In '52 Sports

NEW YORK (AP) — More de-emphasis and a return to "saner levels" in college sports was forecast for 1952 by an overwhelming majority of sports writers and sportscasters participating in the annual Associated Press poll.

Many of them believe, too, that the current campaign for de-emphasis, especially in football, will be crowned with success this year. They predicted tighter control by college presidents, less subsidizing and less stress at winning at any cost.

In answer to the question: "What do you believe will be the outstanding trend, characteristic, or development in sports in 1952?" Pete Norton of the Tampa (Fla.) Morning Tribune replied:

"The return to more sensible levels in college sports with colleges discovering that those gigantic buildings on the campuses of our schools were erected mostly by tax money for educational purposes, and not for the sole purpose of developing football teams. This trend will be gradual in some parts of the country but by 1953 will be firmly on the way. Some coaches will be unhappy, but public opinion is strongly in favor of the schools regaining complete control of sports."

Fred Russell of the Nashville (Tenn.) Banner predicted:

"Less stress on winning at any cost; further efforts to weed out undesirable elements in sports; economy in sports operations and possible reduced admission prices in the hope of increasing attendance."

The views of Norton and Russell about summed up the opinion of three-fourths of the 215 sports columnists who responded to the poll.
