Churchill's Visit Watched Closely By Soviet Union

MOSCOW (U)—It was apparent here Saturday that Russia is watching results of British Prime Minister Churchill's Washington talks with interest and it long has been clear the Soviet Union would not rebuff him if he wanted to come on a tension-easing mission to Moscow.

Since Churchill took office as Prime Minister nearly three months ago, the Soviet press has refrained from objectionable criticism of him.

Comment on his trip to Washington is based mostly on what American papers have said about it.

But the Russians seem much convinced that there are fundamental "antagonisms" between Britain and the United States and they will be surprised if any real bettering of relations between the two countries results from Churchill's trip.

Lately the Soviet press has been reporting that Britons are learning they are gaining little if anything from close association with the United States.

These reports say British workers and a large section of the intelligentsia admire the Soviet Union and would like to be more friendly with her.

The Russians are constantly suggesting both nations would profit from a long term trade agreement between Britain and the Soviet Union.

The number of personal returns filed last year was 391,513, a 4 per cent increase. There were 5,707 corporation returns, an 8 per cent drop.

UMT Given Backing Of Dr. Karl Compton

WASHINGTON (U)—Dr. Karl T. Compton testified Wednesday that Universal Military Training could "become a great moral force in this nation."

The former president of Massachusetts Institute of Technology was a witness before the House Armed Services Committee which is holding open hearings on UMT.

Dr. Compton is a member of a five-man commission which has prepared a blueprint for training approximately 800,000 youths for six months each year. They would serve seven and one half years more in the reserves.

WASHINGTON (U)—President Truman Monday nominated Charles William Davis of Vandalla, Ill., to be chief counsel for the Bureau of Internal Revenue would succeed Charles Oliphant, who resigned recently.

Iran Consulates To Stay Closed

TEHRAN, Iran — Premier Mohammed Mossadeq stood fast Monday against British urging that he withdraw his order for the closing of Britain's nine consulates in Iran.

The shutdown order, he told British Ambassador Sir Francis Shepherd, would stand as long as he is premier. The consulates have been ordered closed by Jan. 21 because, Iran charges, they have been agitating against the government and interfering in Iranian affairs.

Britain has denied the charges. Iran has no consulates in Britain so the British can't take parallel action in retaliation.

In London, political circles felt generally that the two countries are heading for a complete diplomatic break unless Mossadeq alters his course.

Tough Briton Named To Hit Reds In Malaya

LONDON (U)—Britain Tuesday named tough Gen. Sir Gerald Templer to lead an all out drive to wipe out Communist terrorists in tin and rubber rich Malaya.

Templer, 53, was named high commissioner to Malaya with wide powers. Besides holding the normal political authority of a high commissioner, he will direct all military and police strategy against Communist terrorists.

He succeeds Sir Henry Gurney, who was ambushed and shot to death by red raiders last October.

TAIPEH, Formosa (U)—The Chinese Nationalist Defense Minister said Monday the Red China government at Peiping has instructed its workers to refer to Soviet Russia as "the fatherland of the working class."
