Sift and measure flour. Add dry ingredients; sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk and stir to soft dough. Turn onto floured board; knead 30 seconds. Roll into 8x12 inch rectangle. Cut into 4 rectangles, place on baking sheet. Pinch ends together to form "boats". Bake at 450° for 15 minutes.

Public Telephone Rate Increased To 10 Cents

The charges for local calls made on all Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company public and semi-public coin box telephones in Oregon will increase from 5 to 10 cents Jan. 21, R. J. Henwood, local manager announces.

This is the first increase in pay telephone service rates since the service was inaugurated in Oregon. The raise was requested by the company last year and was authorized Jan. 11 by Charles H.

Heitzel, Oregon Public Utilities commissioner.

Increases have been authorized in Washington and California. Details for other authorized monthly telephone rate increases, which will total \$500,000 annually, are being discussed, Henwood said. They will become effective March 1.
