

### Life Problems Abroad Topics Of 'Y' Speaker

Problems of illiteracy, unequal distribution of land and extremely dense population are real and they're serious, a YMCA banquet speaker said Thursday night.

The speaker was Dr. Robert Anderson, Salem surgeon, member of the YMCA board there and chairman of the Pacific Northwest Health and Physical Education Committee. He spoke to some 70 persons attending the third annual YMCA banquet at the Methodist Church.

Dr. Anderson, widely traveled, pointed out that the population density of Italy is 400 persons per square mile, of Japan, 469 per square mile. This compares to

47 per square mile for the United States as a whole and 13 per square mile for Oregon.

It takes two to three acres of cultivated land to support one person one year, Anderson said. At 40 acres per square mile, some areas just don't have sufficient land to support their population, he explained.

"It's a real problem," he said, "We find it hard in this country to realize what it could be to have too little land."

Another serious problem is illiteracy, often as high as 90 percent in some parts of Italy, Anderson said.

"I can understand why Communism appeals to them—it's the only thing that gives them hope. It's hard to conceive here of lack of hope."

Speaking of the YMCA program he commented:

"I believe we have within our grasp to do something that can't be done any other way—to carry the story of America to the people of all the world to the best of our ability. They need our know-how, our machines and our help."

He cited the example of the success of a Mexican YMCA summer recreation camp and rural rehabilitation project which aided Mexican farmers in the area.

### X-Ray Program Benefits Told Rotary Group

The death rate from tuberculosis in Oregon is low, but that does not mean that the chest X-ray survey now being conducted in Douglas County is unimportant.

That was the point stressed by Miss Bertha Parkhurst, health education consultant from the Oregon State Board of Health, in a speech delivered before members of the Rotary Club in the Hotel Umpqua Thursday.

Miss Parkhurst was accompanied by the executive secretary of the Douglas County TB and Health Association, Mrs. W. F. Amiot, who spoke briefly on X-ray unit distribution.

Prevention is still the best method of meeting TB, the speaker emphasized.

"The incidence of tuberculosis in Oregon is low, but there are a number of active cases that have not been discovered," Miss Parkhurst said.

And it is through these unknown cases that the disease is spread, she stated. From each carrier of the germ, several others may be infected.

Early detection also means money saved, Miss Parkhurst noted. A case early discovered can be frequently cured by one year of sanatorium treatment at a cost of \$2500, but advanced cases often require years of special care.

Miss Parkhurst urged all organizations to make application for mass X-rays. She also called for volunteers to aid in the survey, especially those persons having a clerical background.

Ira Byrd, Douglas County chairman of the drive, was highly praised for his organizational work.

"But if the survey is to be successful all persons will have to cooperate," she said.
