Each piece of work submitted should be clearly marked with the artist's name and valuation. Entries will be accepted between Feb. 18 and 24 at 4704 11th N. E., Seattle 5, Wash. Up to five original designs in ceramics and ceramic sculpture will be considered from each artist. A fee of \$1.00 will be charged each entrant.
